County Poultrymen Hold Meeting Here

Discuss Management Pro-
blems Of Chicken
Raising

GIVE SUGGESTIONS

H. E. Crosby Of Oregon State Col-
lege Speaks To Large Crowd

Adoption of a well defined management program, based on fact and not opinion and followed religiously, is the outstanding need of the poultry producer, according to H. E. Crosby, Oregon State College, who talked to approximately eighty poultrymen of Washington County last week at Forest Grove and Beaverton. Sufficient reliable information is available in basic form to make it unnecessary to develop a system of management founded on unsupported opinion. Most of the present problems of poultry keeping have resolved themselves into questions of management.

Protecting the investment by consistently following a definite plan of management founded on proven practices and facts has kept the successful poultryman in business.

Teaching chicks where the heat is under the brooder and teaching them to eat and drink are the two main problems connected with brooding. Outside of these two problems there are no mysteries about chick brooding. Reasonable sanitation is necessary but extreme sanitation usually results disastrously. Keeping the ground in the runs clean and the floor of the brooder clean and dry is the very best method of cutting down worm trouble.

Cutting down the heat in the brooder during the day and holding back pullets to prevent them coming into production are usually not good practices, according to Crosby. There is more reason to cut down on the heat at night when the chicks are all under the hover than in the day time. Development of the pullet flock should be considered from the standpoint of the average rather than the few exceptional birds that grow and develop fastest. Rather than hold back an entire flock it is more desirable to begin the housing by putting the larger and better developed birds in the laying house earlier.

Rearing pullets on range is fundamental and desirable. Some few chicken raisers are rearing the young laying stuff in the house altogether and apparently are successful, but the range method is more desirable. Seeding the range to a permanent grass sod is a practice to be recommended.

Distributing the range houses over the range and not crowding them together in one place will prove better from the sanitation standpoint but will add somewhat to the labor required to care for the pullets. Vaccinating for fowl
