In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby commanded and required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and suit on or before June 15th, 1933, which is more than four weeks after the date of the first publication of this summons, which said publication hereof is of the date of May 4th, 1933, and if you fail to answer, or in some manner plead to said complaint, for want thereof the plaintiff will take a decree against you in accordance therewith, to-wit:
