## ROUGHAGE FOODS OFTEN HELPFUL

Headaches, a generally run-down feeling, bad complexions, what common ills these are, and yet so often how unnecessary! In many cases they are due to nothing more than that equally common ill, constipation, and can be eliminated by removing their cause.

Of course, if the symptoms themselves are severe a physician should be consulted. In a surprising number of instances, however, the condition can be corrected merely by adding to the diet the roughage in which so many of our modern, highly refined foods are lacking, but which is required to stimulate the sluggish intestines.

Roughage is supplied by the leafy fibrous vegetables and fruits and by commercially prepared bran, available at any grocery store and at any season of the year. A special advantage of bran is that in addition to serving as an appetizing breakfast food, it lends itself to use as an ingredient of a wide variety to delicious breads, cakes, puddings and other dishes.

## BRAN GINGER CAKE

1/4 cup shortening  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 cup of bran  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon ginger  
2 teaspoons cinnamon  
1/2 cup sour milk  
1/2 cup molasses  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Cream shortening and sugar together. Add the egg; beat well. Add the bran. Mix and sift the dry ingredients, alternately with the sour milk and molasses. Pour into greased pans and bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) from 30 to 40 minutes.

## CARROT PUDDING

This is a dessert well liked by those who visit Portugal. It is equally nice served with a pudding sauce or with cream.

1/4 cup butter  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1 egg  
2 cups raw carrots, grated  
2 teaspoons lemon peel, grated  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ginger  
Cream the butter. Add the sugar and slightly beaten egg. Stir in the carrots and grated lemon peel. Mix and sift the dry ingredients. Add to first mixture. Bake in a buttered pudding pan for one hour.

Serve hot.

## SENTENCE SUGGESTIONS

Something new is cream cheese blended with orange juice and mixed with a little grated orange rind shaped into balls and served on round butter wafers, garnished parsley.... Good old fashioned corn meal mush is delicious for breakfast served with dark karo and plenty of butter.... Pineapple filling is delicious with date cakes.... Don't laugh until you have tried it, but a new canape is made by dipping pickled gherkins in sweet chocolate and serving them on toasted whole wheat wafers.... Beaten egg white brushed over yeast mixtures gives them a crisp crust and glaze, while a golden brown color is obtained by brushing surfaces with oil, using a pastry brush.
