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## Dairymen Plan To Hold Special Meet

### Will Explain Construction Of Three Practical Types Of Silos

#### TO GIVE COST DETAILS

Sensation Is Of Interest As Many Are Arranging To Have More Ensilage

How to build silos and what they cost are two questions that will be answered for dairymen at a meeting at the court house, Friday, June 2, at 8:00 P. M. Three speakers will explain the costs and construction of the three most practical types of silos, according to Joseph Belanger, assistant county agent, who has arranged for the meeting. There are some kinds of silos, he said, such as tile and concrete which, although excellent for keeping of silage and very long lived, are so expensive to build that few dairymen can even consider them now. It is entirely possible, however, to build a thoroughly practical silo at a cost not exceeding a dollar per ton capacity.

E. S. Parselle, field man for the Carnation Milk Products Company, will explain the construction of the square silo. Mr. Parselle has a small model of this type which shows clearly the details of construction. L. P. Stranahan, manager of the Copeland Lumber Yards in Hillsboro has promised to provide a man to explain the costs and way to build the round wooden hoop silo. Several silos of this sort have been built in Washington county and they have proven economical to build and quite satisfactory. Will Chalmers, Route 2 Forest Grove reports that his silo which is of this type is still in perfect condition after 13 years of service.

Cecil Heyndericks, Route 1 Cornelius, will present cost figures on the wooden stave, iron hoop silo. Mr. Heyndericks has built several silos of this type in different parts of the county and will take up details of construction and method of erection.

The meeting should be of considerable interest to any dairymen who contemplate putting up a silo this summer.

### COUNTY AGENT GIVES DATA ON CORN

Data covering several years results at the Oregon experiment station indicate that late planting of corn providing there is an adequate supply of moisture, has no material effect on the yield or time of maturity. Ordinarily at this time of year most of the corn in Washington county has been planted but this year practically none has been planted. With the supply of moisture we now have planting in the next week or two should do just as well and produce as satisfactory yields as earlier seedings.

Generally farmers prefer to plant corn about the middle of May. This is the more desirable time but under the conditions that have existed this spring the later planting offers just about as good prospects of satisfactory crops. The rainy weather has greatly delayed spring work but has been of real benefit to much of the late sown hay crops. With dry, warm weather these crops would have been much shorter and the hay situation next fall would be more serious.

### DAMAGES ARE SUS-TAINED BY FIRE LOSS

The house and woodshed on the E. K. Denney farm near Raleigh was consumed by fire about 10:30 P. M. Tuesday. The fire started in the woodshed, presumably from defective wiring. Twelve cords of wood were burned but the contents of the house, which was occupied by the Werner Schallbergers was saved. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

## Local Boy Wins Nearly One Hundred Points

### Ross Hart Shows Speed In Track Meets At Corvallis And McMinnville

#### BREAKS RECORDS

Al Cox, Former Beaverton High School Coach, Is Track Trainer

In the invitational track meet at Corvallis, May 15th Ross Hart of Oregon Normal School was high point man coming through with 11 1/5 points to his credit, making a grand total of 77 1/5 points for the season. This mark already surpasses the record of the season of 62 1/2 points.

Competition in the meet was keen and in most instances the Oregon Normal boys were hopelessly outclassed by the Oregon Staters. Hart, however, kept right up with the leaders.

Ross Hart Beaverton High school graduate, took the 220-yard dash establishing a new record of 22.2 seconds. He also took the broad jump with the new record of 21 feet, 12 1/2 inches.

Mr. Al Cox, a track coach at Monmouth, coached Ross at Beaverton. He did not run the 100 yard dash when in school here but since that time Cox has helped to develop him into one of the best century runners in the state. Ross is a sure point getter in any meet.

Al Cox is head-coach at Monmouth high school as well as assistant track coach at the Normal. He has produced some wonderful teams in the past.

In the recent meet of Normal vs. Linfield Hart made the 220-yard in 22 seconds flat. He scored 36 points in the meet, taking five firsts. His points for the season have reached a total of 99 1/5 points. Quoted from Oregon Normal Publication at Monmouth
