FIRST SPRAY FOR CODLING MOTH DUE

By Wm. F. Cyrus County Agent Apple and pear growers in the Willamette Valley should apply the first cover spray now for the control of codling moth. For two or three nights during the past week there was a considerable flight of codling moths and eggs were deposited. The eggs will hatch in from 8 to 16 days, depending on weather conditions. The spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. In orchards where codling moth is not a serious problem, 2 pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water is sufficient to give commercial control.

Calcium arsenate has been used in the Willamette Valley for codling moth control with only slightly less effectiveness than lead arsenate and without injury to the leaves or fruit, according to B. G. Thompson of the Oregon Experiment Station. This material was used at the rate of three pounds per 100 gallons of water plus two pounds of hydrated lime in the cover sprays.

Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control. The foliage, as well as the entire surface of every apple and pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray solution if worm injury is to be prevented. Due to the earliness of the codling moth this year, the first cover spray might be combined with the 15-day scab spray.

R.F.C. FUNDS WANTED FOR WILLAMETTE

Since Multnomah and Clatsop counties have no Farmers' Union, G. W. Potts of Jefferson, Oregon, president of the State Union, suggested that Washington County members help organize locals in those counties.
