Annual School Meeting Is Held

L. W. Short Is Selected to Replace L. R. Dean As a Director

CLERK IS RE-ELECTED

Much of School Revenue Comes from Teaching Pupils of other districts

The school meeting Monday night exhibited several of the usual characteristics this year, but the variations got more attention than the regular proceedings.

The report of the district clerk, Mrs. Althea Haukenbeck, through the collaboration of Supt. I. R. Metzler was presented to the voters in pamphlet form instead of being placed on the blackboard as usual. This report, among other things, showed that much more than half of our school revenues comes from teaching pupils that live outside the Beaverton school district. That this condition exists is largely due to the foresight of the school board, and the very conscientious and efficient work of Mr. Metzler.

Mrs. Haukenbeck was re-elected clerk unanimously. Her work has been very satisfactory to the district, to the school board and the direct management of the school.

L. R. Dean, retiring director, refused to allow his name to be placed before the meeting saying that he had given fifteen years of conscientious service to the work, and that he thought he deserved a rest. J. W. Sprague and L. W. Short were placed in nomination and the ballot showed that these men were both thought very good material for the position. Mr. Short received 50 votes to 39 given Mr. Sprague.

Mr. Dean was then given a rising vote of thanks for his services to the district. Some questions were brought up for discussion, and a few volunteered their views on the matter, but no vote was taken on any of the problems talked of.

Perhaps it may not be amiss to give just a short resume of the development of the school under the directorship of Mr. Dean, but in doing so we do not in any manner wish to suggest that the work of the other directors was any less satisfactory.

In 1918, during our participation in the World War, Mr. Dean succeeded the late S. H. Davis. C. W. Cook and H. E. Weed were the other members of the board, with Miss Katherine Desinger, clerk. Other members during the time Mr. Dean has served include the late F. W. Cady, Doy Gray, Dr. J. R. Talbert, and Dr. C. E. Mason. The last two are still active members. R. H. Jonas was superintendent at the time; he was followed by Mr. Phillips, and then N. P. Nash. There were forty-five students enrolled in the high school. J. P. McGlasson, now superintendent at Forest Grove, succeeded Mr. Nash, and he in turn was succeeded by I. R. Metzler, present superintendent. The present enrollment in the high school is 386 as compared with the 45 when Mr. Dean went on the board.

YOUNG EARWIGS NOW READY FOR POISON

Young earwig hosts are on the march again in yards and gardens, and just at the best stage for effective poisoning, says R. E. Dimick of the Oregon State college department of entomology. In many localities the ranks of the earwigs have been greatly depleted by the ravages of the earwig parasites that have been liberated in Portland and many other cities of the state, but some supplementary poisoning at this season before the parasites are active has been found a big help in control.

The poison most effective is Bran, 12 pounds; sodium Fluosilicate, 1 pound; and fish oil, 1 quart, mixed together without water. The bait is applied thinly over the yard and in large quantities around the base of buildings, trees and fences, avoiding jumps that might attract children.
