The program opened by the singing of "Will There Be Any Stars in My Crown". The subject "West Indies and the Philippine Islands", was discussed. Mrs. John John Armas presented a book review of "Lady Fourth, Daughter of China", by Mary Brewster Hollister.

Mrs. Neal, as leader, presented a few general facts regarding discovery, inhabitants, and religion. At the time of the discovery of Philippines, the inhabitants were largely Mohammedans. The conquest of the islands for Spain was essentially missionary. Under the inspiration of apostolic zeal, the friars penetrated nearly every part of the archipelago and taught the natives the simple elements of civilization, and the tenets of Christian religion as exemplified by the Catholic church. No other large mass of Asiatics has ever been converted to the Christian religion in modern times. What ever has been done for Protestantism has taken place since United States jurisdiction in 1898.

Mrs. R. P. Rasmussen gave the map demonstration, general facts and location in a very pleasing, comprehensive manner. Thus we all "know where we are."

Then Mrs. C. A. Johns of Portland was introduced and made a very delightful, pleasing and instructive talk regarding location, and climate of the Islands, and the ways and habits of the people. She resided there ten years as the wife of the late Justice C. A. Johns of the Supreme Court of Manila. The ladies asked many questions which she graciously answered in a very understanding and pleasant way.

Shute Park To Hold 27th "Happy Days"

Fireworks, Queen's Ball, Dancing, Rides, All Included In Celebration

RACE IS ONE FEATURE

Fine Patriotic Services Are Being Planned by Organizations

The celebration to be held in Shute Park, Hillsboro, July 1, 2, 3, and 4, is the largest of its kind in the local community. It attracts a record attendance from over the entire northwest. Within Shute Park are beautiful shade trees, nice grassy lawns, and pure, cool mountain water, making it an ideal place for family picnics.

The affair is sponsored and managed by the Chamber of Commerce and is a good will affair, and not conducted for profit. The celebration will open July 1st with a big free distribution of gifts at night together with band concerts and dancing. A nice program has also been arranged for Sunday and Sunday night.

The big social feature of the celebration is the queen's ball and coronation ceremonies at 9:00 p.m., July 3rd. Jos. K. Carson, mayor, elect of Portland, will officiate and place the crown on the queen's head.

The sporting feature is the championship race from Portland to Hillsboro, July 4th. The race will start at 9:00 the morning of the Fourth from the Portland Hotel, and is a go-as-you-please affair. It has fifty entrants of athletes from the entire northwest. \$125.00 in cash is being paid to the winners.

The fireworks display will be unusual, and will be held at 9:00 sharp the night of the Fourth.

The Junior Antlers Elks Band, of Portland, will furnish music for the four days. This is a 25-piece band. There will be rides, shows, concessions and plenty of free entertainment. There is no admission to the Park.

Shute Park is located on the highway 17 miles from Portland, 30 miles from McMinnville and fifty miles from Salem.

A fine patriotic program is being arranged for the morning of the Fourth by the American Legion and other patriotic organizations.

SAVINGS & LOAN CO. DECLARES DIVIDEND

The Board of Directors of the Washington Savings & Loan Association, Hillsboro, Oregon, at their meeting held Monday of last week declared a 4% dividend payable July 1st. In addition to paying this dividend, it was found a substantial amount remained which the Board ordered to be added to the Surplus Account.

This is the 16th consecutive semi-annual dividend declared by the Association and in each case the surplus has been increased at the time the dividend was declared. While this is the smallest dividend ever paid by the Association in its history, the Board of Directors feel that in view of economic conditions, the amount declared at this time is satisfactory.

J. M. Person, General Manager, in his report to the Board stated that collections had been better during the past 60 days than they were in the four months from January 1st to May 1st.

Washington Savings & Loan Association of Hillsboro, Oregon, was organized in 1925, and has shown an increase in assets every year with the exception of the last twelve months, has been very slight. The Association conducts its business in the following counties: Washington, Columbia, Tillamook, and Yamhill with its business chiefly confined to Hillsboro, Forest Grove and community. The Company recently joined the Federal Home Land Bank system and expects to start in on a normal scale of business of making loans and refinancing good sound mortgages in the early fall months.

The Board of Directors is made up of men who have been on the Board since organization and is constituted as follows: Dr. J. O. Robb, E. L. Johnson, J. M. Person of Hillsboro, and Geo. G. Hancock, D. D. Eump of Forest Grove, Oregon.

Heart Failure Takes Benjamin E. Brandtner Early this Week

RAILROAD ENGINEER

H. G. Vincent, Former Beaverton Resident, Dies at Hillsboro

BENJAMIN E. BRANDTNER

Benjamin E. Brandtner died very suddenly Monday of heart failure. He was working with a truck and went to work as usual in the morning. Along about ten o'clock he was taken very ill, and brought to Beaverton to Dr. Mason. From there he was taken to his home just south of the Aloha-Huber school where he died at about half past one in the afternoon.

The deceased had been working for a number of years for the S. P. & S. railroad, and lived between the Canyon road and Terwilliger highway. Quite recently the family moved to the Jas. Lewis house south of Huber where they have made their home.

Mr. Brandtner was born at Salt Lake City, May 24, 1884. By profession, he was a railroad engineer. His body was shipped Tuesday from Pegg's undertaking parlors to Glenn's Ferry, Idaho, where the interment will be.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Christina Brandtner, a son, Benjamin Jr., and a daughter, Verona.

H. G. VINCENT

H. G. Vincent, formerly a resident and citizen of Beaverton died at his home at Hillsboro, Tuesday morning of septic sore throat.

Mr. Vincent was born in New York State, May 4, 1859. Later he moved to Iowa where he married, and ran a farm. He came to Oregon and for a number of years, operated a store in Albina.

Having sold his store he came here and purchased the Thayer tract of forty acres on Lombard street which he later sold to Mr. Clement. He then purchased the Julius Henrixson property, across the railroad from the Grange hall, it was then, but West Broadway has been extended so that the property lays north of Broadway and east of Short street, now occupied by Dewey, the Plumber, T. B. Harris and the Bielman Motors Ford agency.

During his residence here he was Councilman for a number of years and at other times held the office of Deputy Assessor for this section.

About thirteen years ago he sold his interests here and moved to Hillsboro where his daughter, Mrs. M. P. Cady, lived.

Mr. Vincent is survived by his widow and three daughters, Mrs. Lois Walworth, and Mrs. Bird Cady of Hillsboro and Mrs. Goldie Davis of South Dakota.

The funeral was held at the Congregational church in Hillsboro on Thursday afternoon with W. E. Pegg in charge.
