Laundry Lessons



KEEPING COLOR IN COTTONS

COLORFUL cottons will not fade or run if proper precautions in washing are taken. Avoid hard rubbing, boiling and harsh soaps. For Best Results 1. Make tepid or cool suds using mild, pure, white soap or flakes. Home-made soap is too unreliable for safe use. A little borax will soften very hard water. 2. Wash only one article at a time, especially when washing new materials. Later, if entirely fast, they may be washed with other colors. 3. Put into suds and wash by hand or machine. Rub badly soiled places gently between hands or on board, using a cake of pure soap if necessary. In a washing machine, run colored cottons separately in lukewarm suds. 4. Use three lukewarm rinsing waters. Starch, if desired, should be very thin, cool, boiled starch. Dry in shade. 5. Lightweight cottons such as voiles, may be rolled up and squeezed in a towel until almost dry and then pressed immediately.

4-H CLUBBERS WORK, AND PLAY AT SCHOOL

The 47 4-H club members from Washington county, who attended the summer school at Corvallis returned home Saturday. About half this group had been to Corvallis in previous years and declared this year's session the best summer school ever. Over 600 boys and girls from almost every county in Oregon were in attendance. Some of the 4-H club members who were attending the two weeks session for the first time, and who had expected a continuous round of games and play were a little surprised at the daily gram.

Everyone turned out at 6:30 for physical exercises, and had breakfast at 7:15. At 8:30, classes began. Classes included tours of the Experiment Station and the Forestry Nursery; dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep and hog judging and management; crop production and judging; seed selection; weed control methods; corn and potato production; farm mechanics; shop and foundry work and many other subjects. No studying was required, but every boy and girl had a notebook in which notes were taken. Classes lasted until shortly before noon.

After lunch a general assembly was held from 1:30 to 2:30. This program was broadcast over KOAC. The afternoons were filled with games and athletic contests with the swimming pools in both the men's and women's gymnasiums available to the club members. The evening meal was followed by some sort of program.

The last Thursday evening was "Stunt Night", with the different groups on the campus putting on some stunt which they had worked up. Several of our Washington county delegation took part in some of the stunts. Don Jossy was perhaps the sensation of the evening dressed as a charming little girl. His darling little white bloomers extending a couple of inches below a print school dress, a narrow sash around his stomach, a chic straw hat with the bright ribbon extending down his back, completed his ensemble, and needed only the lolly-pop which he carried in one hand to complete the picture of carefree childhood.

A radio program by the Washington county delegation, gave an opportunity for each 4-H club member to say hello to his folks, and to thank the firm or agency which had made it possible to be at the summer school.
