EXPLAINS CLUB WORK

Theatres Will Show Feature Picture,
Comedy, Short Subjects, Also

A special movie show at the Venetian Theatre in Hillsboro and the Star Theatre at Forest Grove is scheduled for July 19 in Hillsboro, and July 20 in Forest Grove. A special feature of the show will be a 3-reel talking picture "4-H Club Work, and What It Is." This picture has recently been completed and is being shipped from Washington, D.C., especially for these two shows. In addition to this 3-reel feature, there will be the regular feature show plus a comedy and news shorts. Mr. O. Phelps, manager of the Venetian Theatre, and Mr. F. A. TIME FOR SECOND SPRAY FOR FLY

The second spray for the cherry fruit fly should be applied in those orchards that have not been sprayed for seven days or more. Varieties of cherries that will be picked within seven days should not be sprayed until after the cherries are picked.

The following materials should be used: Lead arsenate, ½ pound; molasses, 2 quarts; water, 10 gallons.

PEAS RICH SOURCE OF FOOD ELEMENTS

Green peas, now abundant in many parts of Oregon, are rich in all of the vitamins known to be needed in the adult diet, according to Miss Lucy A. Case, extension specialist in nutrition at Oregon State college. In addition, they contain more of the body building substance called protein than most vegetables, particularly when dried, and are moderately good sources of minerals and roughage, also important to good health.

Peas are sweetest and most delicious when cooked immediately after picking, Miss Case believes. The green, plump pods, well filled with young, tender peas, are best. Those that are too mature have lost their sweet flavor because the sugar in them has turned to starch.

While peas are simple to cook, care is necessary if their green color and delicate flavor are to be preserved, says Miss Case. She recommends cooking them in a small quantity of boiling water—being careful, of course, that they do not burn. Add one-fourth teaspoon of salt for each cup of water used, and if the peas are not fresh from the garden, or are rather mature, add also one teaspoon of sugar for each cup of water. Then cook them rapidly until tender—about 15 minutes. When done the amount of water left in the pan will be just about enough to serve with the peas, without draining. Leaving the cover off the kettle while boiling helps preserve the green color.

Some people like green peas served with butter, and others prefer them with cream, milk, or a thin white sauce. Buttered or creamed peas may be served plain, or in a great variety of combinations. Miss Case, suggests, for instance, that they may be combined with scrambled eggs, or placed on an omelet before turning one half over the other. They also add attractiveness and flavor to soups, stews, meat loaves and salmon loaves, and are delicious in many salad combinations.

Information on canning and drying peas for winter use is contained in Extension Bulletin 450, "Home Food Preservation", which may be obtained free of charge from county extension agents, or direct from the college at Corvallis.

MARINE CORP TO RE- CRUIT TWENTY MEN

Orders have been received at the Marine Corps recruiting station, Portland, Oregon, authorizing the enlistment of twenty young men during the month of July, 1933.

Applications are being accepted at the Marine Corps recruiting station which is now located at room 208, New Federal Court Building, Sixth and Main Streets, Portland, Oregon.

New requirements provide a minimum age of eighteen (18) years, and a minimum height of sixty eight (68) inches. All applicants are required to pass a rigid physical examination, and to furnish references as to character and educational qualifications.

Men enlisted for first enlistment are transferred to the Marine Corps Base at San Diego, California. Former service men, re-enlisted, will be transferred to the Marine Barracks, Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Washington.

TWO WORDS SIMILAR, MEANINGS DIFFER

When does one use "tubercular"?
When does one use "tuberculosis"?

A leaflet, prepared by Philip P. Jacobs, Ph.D., the best informed educator in the national tuberculosis field, uses definitions approved by the National Tuberculosis Association as follows:

"Tuberculous" is the adjective corresponding to the noun "tuberculosis". It refers to lesions, infections, conditions caused by the tubercle bacillus, the tubercle bacillus, (e.g., "a tuberculous kidney", "tuberculous bone", "of tuberculous origin", "a tuberculous patient".) "Tubercular" refers to conditions resembling tuberculosis, but that actually are not Tubercular means a condition resembling, and similar to, tuberculosis, but a condition that has been established as not being caused by the tubercle bacillus. Its use in reference to tuberculosis is therefore incorrect.

"Tuberculosis" is the name of a specific disease, but may be used both as noun and adjective. One may speak, therefore, of a tuberculosis patient, or of the disease, tuberculosis, just as one speaks of pneumonia, or of a pneumonia patient.

Physicians, nurses, public health workers, and even tuberculosis patients misuse tubercular. Even the dictionaries are not in agreement on it, Dr. Jacobs declares. For all practical purposes, then,

1. Tuberculous is an adjective describing the disease.
2. Tubercular is never used in reference to tuberculosis.
3. Tuberculosis is the name of a disease, used also as adjective.

Copies of the leaflet by Dr. Jacobs, and of others listing symptoms, methods of treatment and prevention, and steps in the cure of tuberculosis, are available at the office of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, 605 Woodlark Building, Portland. Their preparation and distribution is financed by the annual sale of Christmas seals.

When students and others are in need of a substitute or synonym for tuberculosis, the Association suggests "phthisis" pronounced "this-sis. Either one means the same as old-fashioned "consumption". "The White Plague" was used for years as a popular reference to the disease. It originated with the beloved physician of an earlier day, Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, at a time when any of these words spelled death in most cases. The death rate, however, has been cut in half since 1920, showing much recent progress.
