A. Hagoes of Los Angeles, Calif.; and Miss Violet Hagoes of Seattle, Wash. There are also six grandchildren and one brother, Louis A. Hagoes of Seattle, Washington.

He was a member of Bucoda I.O.O.F. No. 129, Centralia Encampment, and Bucoda Rebekah Lodge No. 144.

Mr. Hagoes was a resident of Bucoda for forty five years. Taking active part in the affairs of his community.

OPENING DATE FOR STATE SCHOOLS SET

FORMULA FOR OBTAINING LICENSE

The realization that all drivers' licenses issued before July 1, 1931, will be automatically cancelled by law on September 1st has awakened active interest in many motorists, reports Hal E. Hoss, Secretary of State. The most common question asked at his office is, "What must I do to get a new license?"

Anticipating that this information will be more in demand as the expiration date on all old licenses draws near, Mr. Hoss has issued a brief formula for obtaining a new type license.

First, the applicant must obtain the standard application blank from the Secretary of State or from local examination headquarters, state police, or sheriff's office.

Second, he must fill out the form in full and sign it in the presence of a notary public or other person authorized to administer oaths. All state examiners are notaries and will perform this service without charge.

Third, the applicant must file the completed form before September 1, either by leaving it with an examiner or by sending it to the Secretary of State at Salem. In either case, a payment of \$1 must accompany the application.

Each of the requirements are provided by law, and no license can be issued unless all are complied with, it was stated.

ADVISE TRUCK OWNERS TO KEEP RECORDS

Although a temporary restraining order against the new Motor Transportation Act is in effect, truck owners will do well to keep up the records required under the law, according to the legal department of Allied Truck Owners in Portland.

"So much misinformation concerning this act has been broadcast through the state that truck owners relying on much of it, may find themselves in more difficulties than they are in at present.

"The people of Oregon had a right to pass on an act requiring every truck, and not just a few of them, to be insured so that where accidents occur the victims have some chance of having their cars and their own injuries fixed up," reads a bulletin of Allied Truck Owners.

"Accordingly, it is very doubtful if the injunctions now in litigation will eventually prevail, and our advice to truck owners would be that they keep track of their mileage and otherwise keep complete records of their liability to the state.

"When or if the injunction is finally dissolved, the state officials would then, under their bond to the people, have to collect all moneys due the state from the time the law went into effect, which would be July 1. Unless an operator has kept accurate records in the meantime the state will have no choice but to see that it is fully compensated and if there is any guessing to be done, will by law have to do it, in favor of the state.

"Another thing that small truck owners are not being told is that if at the hearing on the restraining order an injunction should be granted every truck owner who expects to stand back of the injunction as ground for not complying with the law will have to put up bonds insufficient amount to protect the state in the event the injunction is eventually dissolved.

"These bonds will be collateral bonds and will have to be several times the expected liability, so that operators now objecting to the bond requirements of the act will have to produce far greater bonds than those required under the act."

Committee Applies For National Charter

Senator Hare Outlines Necessary Steps At Meeting of Business Men

"OUGHT TO BE EASY"

A Committee Is Chosen, To Be Headed by Dr. J. R. Talbert

At the invitation of the management, practically all the business men of Beaverton met at the bank, Monday evening. Mr. Gray, President of the Bank, opened the meeting with a few well-chosen remarks.

In his statements he told something of the history of the local institution and recited some facts and figures which indicated that probably it would be advisable to either consolidate the local bank with one of the bigger Portland banks or invite in new capital in order to organize a national bank to take over the banking business in Beaverton.

Jim Downing volunteered the suggestion that if it was only a matter of raising the additional capital that will be required to get a national bank charter, the matter "ought to be very easy." Others joined in the general discussions, among them W. G. Hare, former state senator from Washington county, who in a few remarks informed the gathering of some of the steps necessary to secure a national bank charter and laid stress on the matter of the new banking law, carrying a Federal guarantee of bank deposits after January 1, 1934.

[Dr. Mason was then requested to act as chairman of the meeting, and J. W. Sprague was appointed secretary. Motion was made and carried to appoint a committee to look into the matter of the present condition of the Bank of Beaverton and also into the matter of getting a national bank established as the meeting did not seem to favor the merging of this bank with the Portland institutions. The committee chosen consists of Dr. J. R. Talbert, chairman, J. W. Sprague, secretary, M. W. Manning, J. J. Vankleek, Dr. C. E. Mason, A. M. Jannsen, H. P. Downing, Harry Robinson, and Ernest Lehman.

This committee met at the bank and after consultation with the management decided to forward an application for a national bank charter to the Treasury Department at Washington, and to ask that the national bank examiner come to Beaverton and look over the assets to see what part can be taken over by the new national bank.

The present plan embraces the signing of an agreement by the present depositors to have the assets that are not taken over by the national bank, when and if it is established, to have these so-called frozen assets handled by a local committee of people who are conversant with local conditions. It is expected that by handling the affairs in that manner a maximum amount of the deposits can be paid to the depositors.

J. H. NEAL'S ATTEND ANNUAL CLAN PICNIC
