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Local Voters Express Opinions On Measures

Sales Tax and Anti-Prohibition Amendment Vie for Local Interest

MANY VOTE HERE

Results Are Similar In the East
and West Local Precincts

Friday's election brought out a considerably larger number than had been expected to vote on the different measures and propositions before the people for their approval or disapproval. The sales tax tied with the anti-prohibition amendment in getting out the vote as evidenced by the larger number voting on those than on the other measures. At that, in West Beaverton there were 242 votes cast on the sales tax issue to 233 on the wet and dry issue.

In east Beaverton, 326 expressed their opinions on each of the major measures. The same measures carried in both precincts with the exception of one, the debt and taxation limitations for municipal corporations got a tie vote in West Beaverton but in the east precinct the measure lost by the vote of 141 for it to 144 against it.

The vote was heaviest on the Eighteenth Amendment repeal in the east precinct where 223 voted for the repeal to 97 against it. In the west precinct, the vote stood on that question, 145 for repeal, and 88 against it. On the sales tax the east voted 60 for to 266 against the tax but in the west the vote stood 38 for and 204 against.

In the county-wide vote, Jack Anderson of Forest Grove, J. W. Bailey of Hillsboro, E. L. Ross of Hillsboro, and H. A. Stohler of Banks, all of whom are in favor of the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment, were chosen as delegates to the Constitutional convention to be held in this state to vote on this question.

The special city election held Friday of last week brought out a considerable larger vote than did the city election last fall, when 197 votes were cast. This time 228 voted.

The charter lost, 135 to 93.

While there has been for some time a real need of a charter, one proposed contained objectionable features that caused those who had given it careful consideration, to feel that passing the measure as it was submitted would be a greater evil than to leave our present inadequate act in force.

What seems to be indicated by the vote is that a goodly number of Beavertonians feel the need of a new charter, and that given a measure with a few of the objectionable features of the proposed charter eliminated, the new act would be gratefully received and adopted.

Some of the objectionable features were included in the sections dealing with qualifications of certain officers, legal boundaries of the city, emergency fund, advertising fund, the selling of interest-bearing public utility certificates, the issuing of certain bonds without specific authority from the people, the power of the council to order expenditures in excess of the funds available to pay the same and to declare certain items null and void, the power to interfere with business of public service institutions, without defining what constitutes these institutions.

Time for consideration of these matters together with discussions of them with the business and professional men of the community would probably have eliminated many of these features. The discussion would also probably have brought out some features that might be added with profit.

Taken all in all, there were many excellent features in the proposed act, measures that met with grateful response. Just to mention a few of them. The time of the elections, the separation of the offices of recorder and treasurer, the re-bonding of the special assessments, the clear definition of the powers and duties of the city officials, the provision for the sale of property which for different reasons has become city property, and many others.

The author is Mrs. Claire Warner Churchill, of Wheeler, Oregon, and formerly mayor of that town. She is a graduate of the University of Oregon and has made an extensive study of the ethnology of the Oregon coast Indians.

"Slave Wives of Nehalem" takes its title from the fact that the girl characters beginning as slaves, had a charm or resourcefulness or a superiority of action that changed their roles in dramatic ways among the Nehalem Indians. Critics say that in literary quality the volume will take its place among the three outstanding Oregon Indian books, the other two being "The Bridge of the Gods" and "Cathlamet on the Columbia."
