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City Council Holds Regular Meeting

Attorney Reimer to Appear Before Commissioner In Behalf of the City

BILLS ARE ALLOWED

Committee Appointed to Recheck Count of Votes at City Election

This month's meeting of the City Fathers was a busy one. Three visitors were present, besides all the regular City Officials excepting the one policeman on duty and the fire chief. Among the visitors were Paul Drew, of Drew's Nursery, Mr. Wier, a new resident of the city, and J. H. Hulett.

The minutes of the former meeting were read and among the things noted was a request for the County Surveyor to survey and stake out Mill street, a short alley between lots four and five in Steel's Addition. It lays north of the S. P. track and connects West Broadway with Beaverdam Road. If there was a railroad crossing at the place this Mill street would seem to be an extension of Stolt street.

A bill from Dr. Mason for treating one of Fred Goyt's fingers was allowed. This brought out considerable discussion later in the meeting. The report conflicted so that it is difficult to get at the straight of the matter. Auditor Amick stated that the city has been paying the State Industrial Accident Commission for insurance for a number of years. Mayor Fisher said that he could not fill out a report of the accident because there was a question whether regular monthly payments were made to the Commission, and as he could not answer that, the Commission had refused to pay the claim. Recorder Smith stated that the Commission's auditor had just been looking over the City pay roll, and that the City owed the Commission some \$88.00 for back payments. Fordney stated that the City was ahead about three dollars by paying the physician's claim and saying nothing more to the Commission about it.

The Beaverton Sand & Gravel Co. reported readiness to supply rock to finish surfacing Short St. which is being improved with road district funds raised by general taxation. In this matter, Alderman Bishop stated that he was leaving for a time and asked that another be appointed in his stead as a member of the street committee. The Mayor named Councilman Koshland, who is to check the deliveries, and to employ men to spread the rock as delivered.

At this meeting the policemen's report included a statement that he had found several doors unlocked at night. Mapes' application for a beer on drought license was passed without a dissenting vote. Councilman Koshland reported that he had written Public Utilities Commissioner Thomas about the stage facilities and that Thomas had replied that a public hearing was being conducted at Salem, August 10, and invited those interested to go with him, and Mr. Reimer to appear before the Commissioner and present the case of the city against the stage companies. On motion of Mr. Bishop, seconded by Mr. Fordney, Mr. Reimer was instructed to appear and take with him Mr. Koshland. The motion carried, though Councilmen Barnes and Livermore, who said they did not know where the money to pay the bill was coming from, voted against it.

Communications from County Recorder Davis, County Surveyor Hobbs, from Geo. Bauman, from the Gates Pipe Co., from the P.E.P. Co., and from Paul Patterson were read and filed. Under unfinished business the matter of canvassing the votes of the recent special election was mentioned by Mr. Fisher and he thought the votes should be recounted. However after some discussion, Messrs. Boswell and Livermore were appointed a committee to act with the Mayor to recheck the count. This was to be done Wednesday evening.

A service contract on the adding machine was voted and the Recorder reported having brought before him the Coca Cola and McGinnis truck drivers and that the first one paid the license but that the latter stalled and promised to pay the latter part of the month. He also reported receipts of \$108.75 from licenses and other fees.

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J. C. LEEDY IS NEW MANAGER OF CO-OP.

Mr. J. C. Leedy, son of Mrs. Florence Leedy of Tigard, and former resident of Beaverton, who has served as agricultural agent for Douglas County the past six years has accepted the position of manager of the Oregon Turkey Co-operatives, Inc., with head-quarters in Portland.

Mr. Leedy was practically drafted for this position by the directors of the association who have for some time been endeavoring to establish satisfactory marketing conditions at Portland to effect all producers of the state. Mr. Leedy was largely responsible for the creation of the Turkey Co-operatives which comprises organizations in 17 counties of the state.

Leedy in his new office devotes his efforts exclusively to the service of the turkey growers of Oregon. During his period as county agent he has been particularly active in the advancement of co-operative marketing, expansion of commercial egg production, establishment of the Northwestern turkey show at Oakland and the lamb show at Roseburg, along with his general service to the farmers in Douglas county.

DOUBLE SIX HAS MEET AT SHERWOOD

The "Double Six" met on the evening of August 7, at Sherwood with the Rebekah and Oddfellow lodges there as hosts. All lodges in the organization were represented. DATES FOR IRRIGATION TOUR SET

Dates for the fourth annual Willamette valley irrigation tour have just been announced as August 29 and 30 by the Oregon State college extension service, which has sponsored this trip of inspection the last few years.

The two-day tour this year will be confined to the northern part of the valley, probably not extending south of Corvallis. Some new territory to be covered will be irrigation systems in Multnomah and Clackamas counties.

Places to be visited this year will include farms where practically the entire cultivated acreage is irrigated, says Art King, extension soils specialist, who arranges the tour. In the early days of irrigation usually only a single field on a place would be watered, but now there are a growing number of fully irrigated farms, he reports.

Schools To Open September Eleventh

New Contract for Transportation of Students Received by Clerk

NINE MONTHS' TERM

Two New Teachers Have Been Secured for Grade School

School will open September 11 for a nine months term with the following named instructors in charge of the high school:

E. G. Webb, Mathematics; H. L. Hughes, civics and history; Gertrude Robertson, physics and chemistry; Geraldine Sanford, English; Edward Warren, coach and mathematics; Mery Sweeney, history and geography; Amarette Barnes, Elementary science and English; Marie Ann Schaefer, languages; Helen Funk, Commercial; Faith Burk, commercial and library; Erma Meeks, science and home economics.

Two new teachers for the grade school are Lillian Wirth, fourth grade, and Ruth Ann Bates, primary pupils.

Thursday morning Mrs. Althea Haulenbeck, clerk of the Beaverton school district, received the contract for the transportation and education of the students in this vicinity who do not live in a high school district. This contract was agreed upon only after several meetings with the Non-High school board of which Otto Kraus is secretary and A. M. Janssen, chairman.

At the first meeting after the new non-high school district board was organized this board voted to contract with the high schools in Washington county for the transportation and education of the students living outside of high school districts. Just what the terms of the contract should be seems to have been the reason for holding negotiations so long.

Because of the delay in the execution of the contract, Beaverton school board have been uncertain of the number of teachers that would be employed, the length of the school year, and several other matters.

The new contract just received, very similar to that issued to the other high school districts, provides for a flat sum for the transportation of a certain number of students.

The enrollment in the Beaverton Schools in the past ten years is interesting. In 1923 the enrollment was 338; 1924, 354; 1925, 449; 1926, 423; 1927, 500; 1928, 455; 1929, 559; 1930, 574; 1931, 603; 1932, 669; 1933, 674. The decrease in 1926 was probably partly due to the withdrawal of those who entered the newly constructed Tigard Union high school.
