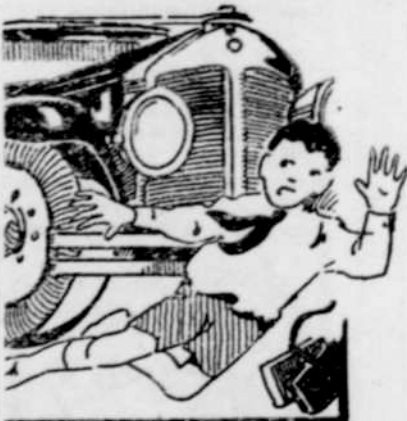

CITY COUNCIL HAS REGULAR MEETING

\$682.56 from water, \$1.82 interest and \$168.02 on street assessments.

Bills were then read, and allowed as read amounting to about \$1,500.00. Some of these bills were \$25 for recorder and \$50 for water clerk; postage, \$9.45, Hicks Chatten for \$10.73; Bishop, \$5.39; Beaverton Lumber, \$9.57; an item of \$91.93 which we did not get who it went to; P. M. Madden Realty Co., \$125.00; A. M. Janssen, \$82.75; Bingham Pump Co., \$131.00; Reimer, salary, \$12.50, three ordinances, \$65.00; F. Goyt, \$70.00; a long list of laborers on pipe line, each from \$5.00 to something like \$50.00; another item we could not hear, \$93.84; \$87.40 to an out-of-town printing concern; to the P.E.P. Co. two different sums, \$87.53 and \$88.55, one for street lights and one for pumping.

One thing noticed was that when the Mayor called for the "clerk" to read anything or to state anything that Homer Wilson invariably responded. Another thing was that Auditor Amicker reported not enough money in the water fund to pay all the current bills against that fund and Councilman Fordney made a motion that money be borrowed from the General Fund to replenish the water fund.

A petty cash fund was established to take care of postage, as when Councilman Koshland asked for a stamp to put on a letter the Recorder had informed him that postage was paid out of personal funds and a bill rendered for the expenditures. On his and Mr. Fordney's insistence, a fund of fifteen dollars was set aside to be used for incidentals to be replenished from the other funds as small sums were drawn out.

Auditor Amicker reported that so far as the budget was concerned, the general fund was already over drawn and that the water fund was not getting in enough money to meet current expenses. Water Superintendent Goyt reported that the

pump had been re-installed, a new one put in, if we got it right, and that the affair was vibrating considerably, though it was pumping satisfactorily. Councilman Bishop spoke in favor of turning the pump back and asking for remuneration from the bonding company, as he considered this machine one that never would be satisfactory. Alderman Boswell spoke in favor of keeping the pump and letting the one who supplied it put it in shape.

Three ordinances were passed through three readings and ordered published in the Beaverton Enterprise though Councilman Barnes called attention to the fact the owners of the Review were owing the Town for street assessments and water and that it was the avowed policy for the City to let people "work out" where possible, their indebtedness to the City.
