STATE FAIR PREMIUMS INCREASED

An increase of 20 per cent on each premium of the state fair premium list has been announced by Max Gehlhar, director of the state fair. The increase will mean that thousands of dollars of additional prize money will go to exhibitors at the state fair, opening Labor Day.

To the dog races in Portland the horse races at Gresham, exhibitors can give thanks. Under Oregon's new legalized racing law, the state racing commission is authorized to turn part of its profits from the pari-mutuel betting system to the state fair, county fairs, and the Pacific International. The dog and horse racing meets which ended this week have proved financially successful to the state racing commission. The pari-mutuel windows at both meets have enjoyed a good play.

Every department of the premium list is increased 20 per cent, except the 4-H Club department. A 25 per cent increase in that department has already been previously arranged.

With the increased premiums, Oregon's list now stands well up with that of other states, despite the lack of an appropriation by the last legislature.

FIRE DESTROYS NOTHING OF VALUE

Quite another report stated that there was an old pile of straw where the owner wanted to put the new straw pile, so he set fire to the old one and watched it.

An eye-witness says that fire started in the straw as it was coming out of the straw stacker, apparently caused by a match getting into the threshing machine. Prompt work saved everything so that no grain, nor the machine nor anything of value was destroyed only time was wasted in getting things out of the way and a new set made.

After receiving her bachelor of arts degree from the University, Mrs. Churchill served as librarian, teacher, newspaper correspondent, and as mayor of the town of Wheeler. All the time she kept studying the short story in the correspondence study department of the extension division, under Grace Edginton Jordan, former editor of Old Oregon. She also borrowed many volumes by mail from the University library with which she pursued her research in the ethnology of the Oregon coast Indians. The combination of ethnology and short story writing has produced her first book which critics declare will establish her literary reputation.
