City Council Holds A Special Meeting

Charter Discussed; Some
Clauses Eliminated by
Vote of Council

TO HOLD PUBLIC MEET

Matter of Establishing Closing
Hours Is Laid On Table

This week's special meeting of the City Fathers brought out a number of visitors, among them L. L. Myers, former City Attorney, Elmer Benson of the City Market, Frank Smith, contractor, Peter J. Hupy of the C. and E. lunch and Hulett of the Review, and the full roster of the City officials who usually attend.

Discussion of different clauses in the City Charter which was voted down at the recent election brought out a vote to eliminate the \$5,000 advertising clause and the \$500 non-reportable emergency fund. Other clauses suggested to be eliminated included the issuing of public utility certificates, the obligation of aldermen to attend every meeting of the Council, and a few others. Following this discussion, Livermore moved and Koshland seconded a motion to hold a public meeting Friday, September 1, to let the public discuss the charter. The idea is that a meeting will iron out some of the exception that caused the charter being voted down at the special election.

A petition signed by some of the grocers and markets asked the Council to establish closing hours for their business places. The matter was laid on the table.

A resolution to allow 600 cubic feet minimum of water until October 1, and 400 cubic feet for the remainder of the year. This brought out considerable discussion but was finally adopted for the period of September with an agreement that the matter should receive further consideration. The Recorder reported that his drafts of costs on the water system gave 28¢ per hundred cubic feet as the cost under the old regime, while now the water cost 20¢ per hundred cubic feet, both being figured as delivered to the consumer, including the cost of the system, the pump, the replacement of the different items like pipe, reservoir, etc.

A letter from Beaverton Sand & Gravel Co. requesting a payment of \$150 on the rock supplied for the streets the City is rockering.

The Water Superintendent reported several families back on their water bills, and on inquiry stated that one was back as much as \$46. The matter of supplying them with water was finally voted on and left to Alderman G. P. Fordney, chairman of the water committee. The matter of installing a new pipe line from the junction of Canyon Road and Broadway on the east side of town, laying the new line on the north side of the highway to the culvert over the ditch and then under the culvert and up the ditch to the present pipeline was discussed and the Recorder requested to write the State Highway commission for permission to lay the line along the highway, about a fifth of a mile.

4-H Club Exhibits At Fair Are Large

Livestock Exhibits Will Be Biggest Ever Shown At 4-H Fair

TO GIVE STYLE SHOW

Eight Granges Are Installing Booths In the Grange Building

Over 75 head of dairy cattle, well over a hundred birds in the poultry show, a dozen hogs, about 10 milk goats, seven sheep and some 40 or 50 rabbits will be seen at the county fair grounds this Friday and Saturday in the biggest show of 4-H club stock ever seen in Washington county. Several head of cattle, hogs and sheep with a large list of poultry entries from the Smith-Hughes agriculture students at Forest Grove will swell the show to proportions seldom seen at a county fair. Every minute of the two day show will be crowded with events which will be of interest to every farmer of Washington County.

The Farmers' Union Girls' Milk-making contest at 8:00 p.m. Saturday will see nine very charming and determined girls competing for the title of Washington County's champion girl milker, and for the large silver loving cup which will go to the local unit whose representative wins the contest.

Programs for two evening entertainments are complete. Dancing will be in order each evening after the early part of the program is done. Friday evening the Hillsboro Grange Drill team will put on a drill demonstration. There will be readings and an accordion duet later.

The always popular girls' style revue is being put on this year for the first time as part of the evening show Saturday.

The 4-H club crops, vegetable, forestry and handicraft exhibits will be placed in the main 4-H club building. New decorative features this year will include a section of a wooden hoop silo built by Copeland Lumber Co., which will serve as an entrance to the exhibit.

L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader, will judge the crops, vegetable, handicraft and forestry exhibits as well as the showmanship and demonstration contests. Chet Bergstrom, county agent of Tillamook County will be judge of cattle, swine, sheep and goats, and E. R. Stromquist will judge poultry.

BULLETIN CONTAINS FERTILITY REPORTS

Results of fertilizer and soil improvement trials applicable particularly to the Grande Ronde valley in Union county, but containing much general information as well, have just been reported on in a new Oregon State college experiment station bulletin, No. 311, entitled, "Maintaining Fertility of Grande Ronde Valley Soils."

The bulletin is written by Dr. W. L. Powers, head of the soils department, and D. E. Richards, superintendent of the Oregon State Livestock branch experiment station at Union, where most of the trials were conducted.

Included in the bulletin are reports on fertilizer trials, management practices for Grande Ronde valley soils, rotation experiments, and reports on fertility of the various soil types and amounts removed by specific crops.

Preliminary results from 19 crop rotations maintained for eight years indicate that rotating with legumes such as peas or use of annual sweet clover with spring wheat will increase the yearly income.
