FUTURE FOOTBALL STARS

DEVELOPING AT ST. MARY'S

American and National League Are Battling for Championship.

What promises to be the most successful football season in the history of St. Mary's home for boys is now well under way. Two leagues—the American and National—have been organized and a schedule of games adopted. Teams comprising the American league, the Grays, Huskies, Aces and Ramblers, captained respectively by James McConnell, Thomas Ralph, Ted Monson and Jesse Webb, will battle for the championship in the senior circuit. The winning team will be feted to a banquet and each individual member will be awarded a letter.

The national league is likewise composed of four teams, Lions, Stars, Pintos and Wildcats, headed respectively by Jack Beste, Melvin Johnson, Willie Sauter and Peter Bizko. This league, composed of juniors, will likewise go through a schedule, three teams meeting its opponent three times to determine the winner of the league.

The races are very interesting. To date several hotly contested, close and exciting games have been played, with McConnell's Grays leading the procession in the American league, and Johnson's Stars at the top of the ladder in the National circuit. In the past years these junior leagues have been the nursery for developing players for the "Varsity." All the boys need to become varsity stars is to increase in age, size and weight. Several college stars of today began their football careers in the junior leagues at St. Mary's. A few of these are Corcoran, star fullback at Columbia university; Galassi, right half at Loyola university; Cardullo, center at Oregon college; and Woodard, sub end at Brophy College.

But athletic sports are a side issue at St. Mary's. In addition to the regular classes in the grades, each boy has his allotted task. Moreover, his conduct must be good, and his school work satisfactory to retain his position on the team. If he falls below par, a substitute takes his place, until his teacher recommends him to the director of athletics for reinstatement. In this way the boys receive a balanced education, that is, physical, mental and moral.

MANY ACTIVITIES IN HAND AT BEAVERTON GRADE SCHOOL

Classes Working On Various Projects of Interest to All.

A grade school band will be organized this year under the direction of Mr. Bushnell. The first meeting will be on Thursday, September 28.

The Bible class will be resumed to continue the work of last year. The class will meet after school on Tuesdays.

Photographs of each class were taken Monday and will be for sale soon. The fire squad has been reorganized, with two members from each of the three upper grades. Almost every class has an interesting project of some kind in progress. Since the deer season is here, the fourth grade is working on a project correlating hygiene, from the point of view of safety, with language and art. Some very attractive posters were made, showing deer in the woods. Improvement in silent reading rates is being emphasized in several rooms. Graphs showing rate and comprehension are on display in the fourth, seventh and eighth grade rooms.

Original plans of the "City Beautiful" or well-planned city, has been a civics problem in grade eight. Much thought was required in the planning of these cities to provide beauty, safety and convenience.
