Town Board Greases Skids and Smith Slides Out

RESOLUTION DEMOTES RECORDER AND FRED GOYT IS PROMOTED TO POSITION OF WATER CLERK

The fight which has been brewing in the town council for several weeks past on Town Recorder Lewis Smith reached a climax Monday night when a resolution introduced by Councilman Fred Koshland removing Smith from the position of water clerk and appointing Fred Goyt, water superintendent, to fill the vacancy was adopted by a vote of 4 to 1. Councilmen Bishop, Boswell, Fordney and Koshland voting to oust the water clerk and Livermore opposing the resolution.

At a previous meeting Koshland introduced a similar resolution, but it was tabled because of not being seconded. Monday night, however, Koshland succeeded in getting a second to his resolution when Fordney supported the motion.

Smith has been accused at various times with inefficiency, lack of courtesy and absence from duty. His position as recorder is elective and, therefore, he cannot be removed from that office except through the recall.

The resolution which removed Smith as water clerk reads as follows: "Whereas the work of the present water clerk has been unsatisfactory, therefore be it resolved by the people of the town of Beaverton that to serve the best interests of the town of Beaverton, Fred H. Goyt hereby is appointed water clerk for the town of

Beaverton, to serve during satisfactory service rendered, or until his successor is appointed. That the salary of said water clerk-water superintendent shall be \$100 per month. That said appointment shall become effective on the 17th day of October, 1933."

Recent digging operations by town officials during the past month has disclosed the fact that a number of citizens of the town have been defrauding the water department by appropriating water from the mains by connecting up with taps between the meters and the main, thus defrauding the town of thousands of dollars. In order to stop this practice the town attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance making it a felony for anyone to misappropriate water by tapping around meters. The resolution received the unanimous approval of the board.

A motion by Fordney and seconded by Bishop directing that the budget as printed in the Review the previous week be recalled was adopted. This move was made necessary by the fact that Smith had been removed as water clerk and a revision was necessary to provide for his future remuneration.

The meeting Wednesday night was principally for the purpose of revising the budget, which appears today in the Review as corrected.

WASHINGTON FIRST COUNTY TO USE CERTIFIED SEED

It will be of interest to residents of Washington county to know that potato seed certification in western Oregon was first begun in this county and that H. P. Strickler of Sherwood was the first grower west of the Cascades to have a field certified.

Forty-eight farmers in Washington county in 1932 had 254 acres approved. One of the projects of the extension service last year was to increase the acreage of the certified rural type. The entire acreage of this kind (Irish Cobbler) is now being grown by Rowell brothers at Scholls.

A growing practice on Washington county farms is the seeding of canary grass on land that is too wet for other crops. T. B. Denney of Beaverton, J. J. Van Kleek of Linton and W. T. Putnam and sons of Farmington are three who seeded the canary grass for pasture last spring.

STRICT COMPLIANCE WITH LAW TO BE ENFORCED

State Department of Agriculture Issues Orders to Inspectors

The division of market enforcement of the state department of agriculture has issued instructions to all members of its inspection force to insist upon a strict compliance with the laws on proper branding and identification of all produce containers, and just as strict observation on the part of growers and dealers that the produce in the containers be up to the grade indicated.

This applies to all crates, boxes, chests, lugs, etc., and especially to sacks containing potatoes. Proper compliance in this respect affords mutual protection to grower, dealer and consumer, and in the final interests of the last mentioned must be insisted upon. Potatoes should be identified as follows:

The letters and figures on bags of 100 pounds or more shall be not less than 1 1/2 inches in height; bags of 50 pounds, 1 inch; and bags of 25 pounds, 3/4 inch. The information required on such bags is: (1) Name of the state where grown; (2) grade of potatoes in the container; (3) name and address or the brand of the grower or dealer. The following is a sample:

Citrus fruits have been found bearing scale in some of the stores and fruit stands throughout the county. Smaller stores are usually made the receivers of such contraband deliveries and should therefore be certain for their own protection that all containers received are properly identified. Only when this is so can the state department aid in securing adjustments.
