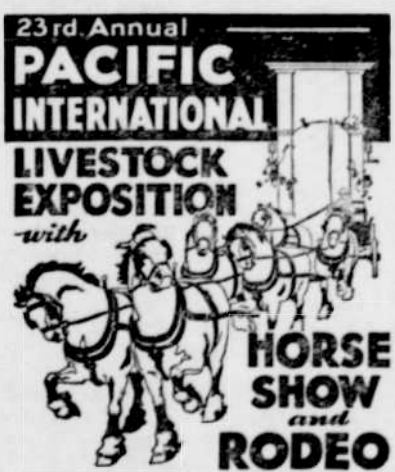
At the meeting also was discussed the program of the sea scouts and its probable local application, and opinions on camping—past and future.
