The water in Beaverton mains was turned off last night at 8 o'clock and will probably be off until after 8 A. M. today. This was necessitated because of repairs being made to the main conduit leading into town, where work has been progressing for the past two weeks in bringing the main from its old location near the "Y" to a point several hundred feet nearer town and tunneling under the highway.

All residents who could be reached by phone were notified last night and warned to fill all spare receptacles with water.
