THE END OF PROHIBITION.

The elections Tuesday spelled the end of prohibition in the United States. Thirty-three states already had cast their votes in favor of repeal, and with Utah, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Kentucky falling into line Tuesday, the total was brought up to 37 states, one more than necessary to defeat the eighteenth amendment.

December 6 probably will be the day on which ratification will become effective, but not later than December 7. Now that the people have expressed their views in no uncertain terms, it is to be hoped that they will be moderate in their appetites and not allow their enthusiasm to overbalance their good sense.

CORN AND HOG PRODUCTION CONTROL BEING ORGANIZED

Heavy Processing Tax Goes Into Effect This Week Just as the completion of the wheat organization work is in sight comes another agricultural adjustment deal of interest to Oregon farmers, says W. F. Cyrus, county agent.

With the period for signing up acreage in the agricultural adjustment administration wheat production control plan now over, farmers in Oregon, representing 87 per cent of the acreage, have signed applications for contracts under which they will agree to reduce acreage 15 per cent in the crop years 1934 and 1935, it was reported by Mr. Cyrus Tuesday.

Only five states exceeded the 87 per cent sign-up reported by Oregon. The heaviest sign-up was in the eastern Oregon counties where wheat production is the major farm enterprise. In several of the large producing counties, such as Umatilla and Sherman, applications run well over 90 per cent of the acreage.

Homemakers' Exchange

Old English Fruit Cake.

- This makes 30 pounds. 5 packages seeded raisins (or 3 seeded and 2 seedless) 5 packages English currants 10 packages citron (1/4 pound each) 5 packages each candied orange and lemon peel (1/4 pound each) 5 packages dates (1/2 pound each, pitted) 1/2 pound candied pineapple 1/2 pound candied cherries 2 1/2 pounds flour (4 cups, sifted, equal 1 pound) 2 1/2 pounds butter 2 1/2 dozen eggs 5 large lemons to equal 1 1/4 cup juice 5 large oranges to equal 1 1/4 cup juice 1 cup grape juice or sweet cider 1 1/4 cups almonds 7 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon 5 teaspoons nutmeg 2 1/2 teaspoons mace 5 teaspoons allspice 5 teaspoons salt 5 tablespoons baking powder

The directions are about the same as those I gave last week with a few exceptions and additions. Four boiling water over the seedless raisins (if used) also the English currants, drain and dry a bit in a warm oven. This puffs them and makes them a little more tender.

Put in oiled paper-lined pans one or two pounds each. For every one pound of cake desired use one pound, two ounces of butter. Tie over each pan an oiled paper. Steam the pound loaves 2 1/2 hours. Remove the paper and finish in a very moderate oven (250 degrees) for one half hour. Let cool in pans. Remove and wrap in wax paper to keep and

SPINAL DEFECTS COMMON IN BOYS AND GIRLS

Just how common spinal deformity of one kind or another is brought out early last summer by an investigation of Brooklyn, N. Y., high school girls carried on by Dr. Charles D. Napier. According to the New York Times of June 25, a high percentage of minor spinal, leg and foot deformities was found. The doctor is reported as saying that spinal defects are more numerous in girls than in boys and that the early detection and care might prevent serious trouble later.
