TUBERCULOSIS SEAL SALE  
SETS GOAL FOR COUNTYFunds To Be Allocated to County  
Health Association

Under the direction of Mrs. George  
Hauman, chairman of the Christmas  
tuberculosis seal sale for Washington  
county, organization is being com-  
pleted toward a goal of five seals per  
capita. Pennies, nickels, dimes and dol-  
lars received from the seal sale are the  
sole support of the national and  
state tuberculosis work and the County  
Health association.

Forty per cent of the sales is kept  
in Washington county for the work  
of the County Health association. Of  
this money a third will be used to buy  
X-ray plates for the testing of tuber-  
culosis suspect cases reported by the  
local health chairman and toxin anti-  
toxin where it can not be supplied by  
parents or the local health committee.  
The second third is held in reserve for  
health emergencies throughout the  
year and the last third will be spent  
on health education and disease pre-  
vention through clinics and classes,  
with the sum of \$50 set aside for the  
cost of supplies and the administration  
of the association for the year.

A Danish postal clerk conceived the  
idea of the Christmas seal in 1903. In  
1907 the seal was first used for the  
support of a local tuberculosis sanato-  
rium in Delaware. Since 1910 the  
seal sale has been managed by the  
National Tuberculosis association and  
since 1919 the seal has borne the  
double-barred cross, the emblem of the  
tuberculosis movement.  
In 1904 the death rate from tuber-  
culosis was 201 per 100,000 population.  
In 1929 it was 76 per 100,000 population.  
Careful study shows that nine active  
cases exist for every annual death from  
tuberculosis. As a result of Christmas  
seal sales year after year there were  
600 sanatoria with 80,000 beds in the  
United States and 1060 permanent and  
2565 temporary clinics in 1928. There  
are two sanatoria in Oregon. Patients  
from Washington county are in both.  
Mrs. Essex Marsh is chairman of  
the Christmas seal sale in Beaverton,  
which will open December 1.

## METHODIST

Rev. George F. Gordon

What is on the layman's mind? Who  
wishes to answer this question? It is  
our purpose to make our church ser-  
vice society. It is no easy task to discover  
the best means and methods to use in  
reaching people. The great lack of

young homemakers in the average  
church is evidence that the church is  
not reaching this class and group. A  
cut and dried theology much out of  
date is sufficient to lull most church  
people to sleep and keep them con-  
tented. The great multitude on the out-  
side of the church are not interested  
in dead issues and theological phrases  
that have very little if any meaning  
for the present generation.

There is always a group of progres-  
sive thinkers in a church but generally  
they have little opportunity of expres-  
sing their viewpoints and putting into  
practice the things they wish to ac-  
complish. The older and more conser-  
vative element generally holds the upper  
hand. They have such an elevated  
standard of Christianity that they can  
show an ill spirit toward those who  
are not so well grounded in church life  
and dogma. They rather resent new  
blood taking up the responsibility that  
was thrust on them 30 or more years  
ago. The story of the dog in the manger  
carries over into human relationship.  
The old, old story of the new taking  
place of the old is more evident in re-  
ligious circles than it is in any other  
phase of human interest. The clash has  
always been evident and always will  
be. Some people have the idea that a  
church that is packed to the doors  
twice on Sunday is a live growing in-  
stitution. This is not true. It may only  
mean that people are being lulled to  
sleep and awoken now and then to see  
that the minister is still on the  
right track. If he is they continue to  
slumber on, but look out if he says  
something that their great grand-  
fathers did not believe in.

I have often wondered just what is  
on the layman's mind. What kind of  
a program does a community want?  
What is wrong with the average  
church? Why do not more people at-  
tend church services?

In order to find an answer to these

MASTER RETAIL CODE GETS  
APPROVAL OF PRESIDENT

mental subdivisions.) Credit based on  
wage deduction agreements with em-  
ployers may not be extended by re-  
tailers in the district. (A retailer's own  
bona fide employees may be extended  
this type of credit.)

No retailer shall increase prices be-  
yond the standards made necessary  
by increased overhead costs or in-  
creased invoice costs. Prices are to be  
fixed with those charged June 1, 1933,  
as a standard basis, plus increased in-  
voice costs, plus increased overhead re-  
sulting from conformity with the code.  
(Adjustments will be made equitably  
if the prices charged June 1, 1933, were  
actual distress prices.)

These are salient features of the re-  
tail trade code approved by President  
Roosevelt. It is the right and the duty  
of every consumer to inquire of any  
retailer to learn if the code provisions  
are being followed. Any violation of the  
code strikes at the heart of the re-  
covery program, which aims to in-  
crease employment and aid business.

Any violation of this code should be  
reported to Frank Messinger, district  
compliance director, 215 Postoffice  
building, Portland, Or. Complaints will  
be received involving violations of  
price, wage, hour or fair competition  
provisions of the code, and will be  
promptly investigated.
