INTERESTING TALKS HEARD AT KIWANIAN LUNCHEON

Plea for Support of NRA Program Made by E. V. Norman.

Edward Bellis, consulting psychologist, and E. V. Norman, representative of the United States chamber of commerce, addressed the members of the Kiwanis club at their Wednesday noon luncheon, and both gentlemen were given close attention during the course of their remarks.

Mr. Bellis explained how children are started on the wrong road in life's affairs when they are compelled by their parents to choose a vocation which is distasteful to them and told of how he had been able in many instances to correct this condition through a psychological analysis of the child and calling the parents' attention to the injustice that was being done. He recommended that the child be consulted in all instances.

Mr. Norman spoke of the activities of the United States chamber of commerce and the effect on the business conditions of the country. He deplored the fact that some communities had allowed the local chamber to disband and urged that Beaverton take more interest in its chamber and affiliate, as nearly as possible, with the national organization.

He also impressed upon his audience the necessity of complete cooperation with the president's program as outlined in the national recovery act. Every business man and every consumer, he said, should stand solidly behind the NRA. Insidious attacks are being made and will be made in the future upon the president's policy, he said, but under no circumstances must these attacks be allowed to wreck the program.

APPLICATIONS FOR LOANS WILL BE SPEEDED UP Federal Land Bank Now in Position to Expedite Business

Farmers whose properties are threatened with foreclosure are assured that their applications for farm loans will receive prompt attention by the Federal Land bank of Spokane, according to E. M. Ehrhardt, president.

At the suggestion of the farm credit administration of Washington, D. C., a committee on emergency cases has been organized in each federal land bank. The purpose of this committee is to hasten consideration of applications for loans sought for the purpose of paying encumbrances on which foreclosure is pending or close at hand.

"Faced with the loss of their property by foreclosure proceedings, the owners of a farm in Whitman county, Washington, received the welcome news a few days ago that the Federal Land bank of Spokane had approved a loan on their farm in sufficient amount to pay off the threatening lien," A. Olsen, chairman of the Spokane bank committee, said. "With other sources of credit gone the family, in an effort to avert the foreclosure of their farm, applied for a land bank loan. The holder of the mortgage had threatened foreclosure and had retained an attorney for that purpose. The situation was one requiring prompt action. Upon making their plight known to the farm credit administration of Washington, D. C., immediate contact was had with the Federal Land bank of Spokane which, after being satisfied that the security was adequate, approved the loan."

Individual cases were mentioned as follows:

Proceedings were started to cancel a Washington farmer's purchase contract on his home, partly paid for. Immediate appraisal was ordered and the security was judged sufficient to allow a loan large enough to pay the balance on the contract price of \$4300. A \$2000 note was canceled from the indebtedness, thus allowing the farmer to pay off all his debts on the loan allowed.

The farmer's home had been foreclosed and sold for \$3600 on another case reported. Delinquent taxes reported amounted to \$482. The holder of the sheriff's certificate agreed to accept \$2947 upon being advised that that sum was the maximum loan possible. This scaling down of the farmer's debt by the sheriff's sale purchaser was sufficient to save the original farmer from losing his home, as the appraisal showed values sufficient for a loan to pay the adjusted amount.

"The bank is in receipt of a large volume of applications, which necessarily slows up the consideration of the individual case," President Ehrhardt continued. "There are among those a number on which foreclosure of existing liens is pending or threatened and it is the function of this committee to expedite the consideration of those cases which are called to its attention to the end that if the applicant is an eligible borrower, and the security adequate, the services of the farm credit administration may be made available to him before his property is lost."

In addition to hastening consideration of the applications on file, it is the purpose of the land bank committee to contact others where the loss of property is threatened but who have not yet applied for a federal land bank loan.

An average of eight cases a day have been referred to the land bank committee for attention during the last two weeks. Not all can be solved, but those which can be worked out make the effort of the committee worth while.

The Red Cross drive is starting Monday, November 13. This is a direct help to our relief program, as outing flannel, shoes, flour, etc., are given to our own needy.

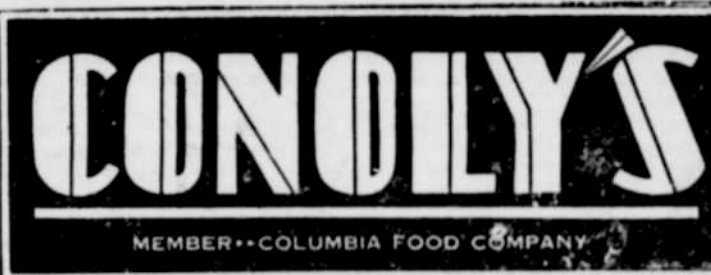
