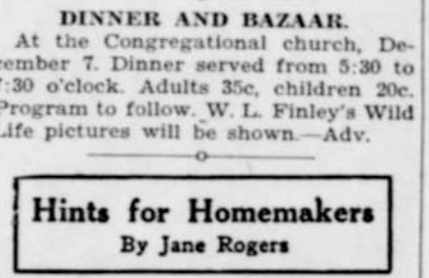
CARNIVAL AND BAZAAR DEC. 7.

to have these allotments as accurate as possible. The maximum acreage which may be sown to wheat for the 1934 crop on each farm, under the reduction requirements of the contract, is also listed.

The Washington county allotment, which has been calculated from records of the United States department of agriculture, is 350,129 bushels. This is the total number of bushels allotted to the county under the wheat plan. The total of the individual allotments, including those allotments which could have been assigned to farms which are not participating under the wheat program, must be in line with the county allotment figure.

In the abbreviations used in listing the information below, "A" means acres; "Allot." means the individual wheat allotment for the farm; "Max." means the maximum acreage of wheat which can be sown on the farm for the 1934 crop, under the contract.
