NEW TOMATO VALUABLE.

The Pritchard tomato is a new variety developed by the United States department of agriculture which is worthy of a place in Oregon gardens, according to a new circular of information concerning it just issued by A. G. B. Bouquet, professor of vegetable crops at Oregon State college. This variety is a moderately heavy productive variety, ripening soon after Earliana, bearing scarlet fruit that is medium large, smooth, globular and solid. The plant is a vigorous grower but "self-topping." It was formerly called Scarlet Topper, but the name has been changed to that of its originator, F. J. Pritchard, who died recently.

LEGISLATORS ARE WORKING TO FINISH JOB SATURDAY

(Continued From Page 1.) This legislative assembly of having failed to do everything within their power to bring about the needed legislation, but there is a limit to human endurance, and Oregon's legislators have reached that limit. If, on the other hand, they decide to rush things through at the last moment, just hell will be pay. In every instance where this has been done jokers have been inserted in important legislative acts at the last moment, too late to be detected by the legislators themselves, with the result that a hap-hazard sort of legislation has been enacted, all of which was open to revision of the courts.

It is to be hoped that nothing of this kind will happen at this session. It is to be hoped that the members of both houses will reserve to themselves a final privilege of revising the work of this session. It is to be hoped that no piece of legislation of a remedial nature will be allowed to pass either house and come up to the governor for his signature before the session constitutionally expires.

Jack Akin, chief clerk and legislative adviser of the house committee on liquor control, has been having his troubles during the past week. First, Jack was empowered to insert a mess of amendments that had been amended and reamended into house bill No. 1, more commonly known as the "whisky act." After Jack had completed his labors, assisted by the senate enrolled and engrossed bills committee, which had been called into the breach to engross house bill No. 1, he found that it would be necessary to reengross the bill in order to insert other amendments which had been agreed upon by the committee in the interim, so it was rushed over to the house committee late Saturday, and after a frantic search for stenographers, proof readers and other employees on that committee the work was completed, and another copy of the bill sent to the printer. Jack's greatest trouble, however, was in the use of the word "delete" or "delete," which, of course, is used quite often in amendments to a bill. Some one will move that a certain word or words be deleted, and in lieu thereof other words inserted, but Jack couldn't articulate the word and invariably referred to it as "replete." If Jack's verbal diction had been incorporated in the bill, boy, oh boy, what a job it would have been.
