Oregon Farmers

Garnet Chili Potatoes Grown.

Doris Young, Wilsonville farmer, who began a potato seed selection program in 1929 in cooperation with County Agent J. J. Inskeep, this year harvested 16 acres of certified Garnet Chili potatoes, which yielded an average of 135 field sacks per acre. In addition to furnishing many Clackamas county potato growers with certified Garnet Chili seed, Mr. Young has found an excellent market in California, according to Inskeep.

Farmers Pool Orders.

Thirteen Lincoln county farmers recently pooled orders through the county agent's office for a 25-ton car of lime from the state lime plant.

County Agent Has Many Callers.

A total of 3765 calls were made at the county agent's office during the past year by the people of Polk county for assistance and advice in their agricultural problems—an average of more than 300 a month—according to the annual report filed by J. R. Beck, county agent, with the central extension office. In addition, Mr. Beck visited 746 farms during the year.

A total of 72½ acres of crested wheat

grass were sown by nine Lake county farmers this fall, reports County Agent Victor W. Johnson of Lakeview. The plantings ranged from one to 25 acres, and all were on dry land with the exception of 7½ acres on the George Stockburger farm.
