The clever lightweight, who has yet to lose a decision in the northwest, dominated in all of the infighting. At one time in the fourth round he had Dumaguilles at his mercy, hitting him at will, while the Filipino's right was securely tied up under Brown's elbow.

Brown is a student at Beaverton Hi and is well known here.

NEGOTIATIONS FOR CANNERY SALE MADE

Negotiations for the sale of the Ray-Maling cannery at Hillsboro to a Delaware corporation are now underway, H. W. Ray, president of the board of directors, has announced. The Delaware concern would only take the physical assets of the cannery and of the Frosted Foods equipment, leaving the Ray-Maling company as the sales organization, using its own labels to market the goods.

Construction of the Ray-Maling plant in Hillsboro was started in 1919, after Bert E. Maling became associated with Mr. Ray, who was then conducting the Hillsboro Canning company. Actual operation of the Ray-Maling plant did not start until 1920. Mr. Maling is president and manager of the company.

Mr. Ray and Mr. Maling will retain their offices in Hillsboro. Mr. Maling will remain as manager of the cannery under the new ownership.

P. U. ORGANIZES SUPERVISORS' BOARD

Accepting the invitation of President John F. Dobbs at Pacific University a group of men met for dinner at McCormick hall, the boys' dormitory, Tuesday evening, January 9, inspected the building, were entertained by group singing at dinner by the resident college students and the dean of men, Carlyn R. Winger, and then retired to the president's office in Marsh Hall.

After thorough discussion it was decided to organize a board of supervisors of thirty men, residents of Washington county, for the purpose of promoting good will and educational relationships between the college and Washington County. This board is to be authorized by the board of trustees at their meeting in February. The board of supervisors will be organized along the same lines as that of the board of trustees—groups of five men elected at the first regular meeting of the board to hold office from one to six years. Thereafter the members will be elected for six years.

A constitution was adopted and officers elected as follows: Chairman, George A. Bouman, Forest Grove; Vice-chairman, C. T. Richardson, Hillsboro; Treasurer, Omar Fendall, Forest Grove; and Secretary, Hugh McGilvra, Forest Grove. The members elected to the Board of Supervisors of Pacific University follow: Messrs. G. A. Bauman, C. A. Brodersen, Richard Fendall, Omar Fendall, Hugh McGilvra, Max Reeher, C. Condit, R. I. Mills, all of Forest Grove; Thomas Tongue, C. T. Richardson, J. W. Connell, W. G. Hare, M. P. Cady, M. H. Stevenson, J. M. Person, H. A. Deck, Russell Morgan of Hillsboro; T. R. Fowler, E. H. Nedry, J. O. Johnson of Tigard; J. Henry Johnson, A. M. Janssen, Dr. Jess Talbert of Beaverton; W. L. Moore, Arthur Wahl of Banks; Finis Brown of Laurel; Frank Rowell of Scholls; and T. R. Roe, H. A. Miller of Gaston.

It will be the purpose of this board to become thoroughly acquainted with every phase of the operation of Pacific University in order that they may intelligently counsel young people in their respective communities in the matter of choosing Pacific as their college.

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LIMITATION LAW DE- CLARED EFFECTIVE

I. H. VanWinkle, attorney-general for Oregon, has reversed his previous verbal opinion, that the initial non-high school district budget does not come under the limitation law.

That the initial non-high school district levy could not exceed the highest tax placed on the district during the past three years for transportation and tuition by more than six per cent was the opinion of the attorney general. Millage will be 11.3 mills in place of 12.0 as at first planned.
