Emma had been in Traverse City that day and had told Eva that she was looking for some one for supper and would she, Eva, come out and help get supper ready? Sure, "company never bothers me" Eva assured her and both were waiting supper at Chas. Drake's home.

When we drove up Emma stuck out her head cautiously, then went back and shouted for Eva. Eva did not care to go out and so she started putting supper on the table. But after getting half way to the car Emma reiterated her call for Eva to "Come on out!" Charlie was soon on hand and what a hugging and "Well, I never," and "What do you know about this?" Emma and Eva had given up ever seeing again the sister who lived away out on the Pacific Coast.

The card we had sent had enumerated all the good things we wanted for supper: ice cream, pumpkin pie, apple pie, fried chicken, strawberry shortcake, everything we could think of that there was room on the card to mention. WOMEN TO LEARN CRAFTS BY RADIO

To help Oregon homemakers overcome some of the handicaps of the depression by "creating beauty with home crafts," a series of 13 radio broadcasts under that title has been arranged by KOAC, the state-owned station on the state college campus at Corvallis. The program is being broadcast each Friday starting at 3 o'clock. At least part of them will be re-broadcast simultaneously by KBPS the Benson high school station in Portland.

The series of lectures will be given by Cecile McAllister, experienced homemaker and former instructor in the Portland Extension center. Supplementary ma-

terial is supplied weekly without charge to all who enroll in the course by sending in their names to KOAC.

The course includes such practical arts as preparing wool for home use, gathering native dyes from the Oregon woods, how to make beautiful hooked or braided rugs from scraps; knitting, crocheting and stitching; and even several lessons on possibilities in weaving.

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for Washington County, H. A. Kuratli and J. J. Wlamer, Plaintiffs, vs. Gust Richardson, Sylvia Richardson, and Laura B. Morgan, Defendants.

To Gust Richardson, Defendant: IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before Wed., the 28th day of Feb. A.D. 1934, a date being after the expiration of 4 weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons upon you in The Beaverton Review, the date of first publication being Friday, January 19, 1934, and the date of the last publication being Friday, Feb. 16, 1934; and you will please take notice that if you fail so to appear and answer said complaint, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for, and their complaint, to-wit: for a judgment and decree in favor of plaintiffs and against said defendants and each of them, as follows:

FIRST: For a judgment against said defendant, Gust Richardson, for the sum of \$100.00 with interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum since July 23, 1931, and the further sum of \$50.00 attorney's fees and for plaintiffs' costs and disbursements of this suit on the first cause of suit set forth in plaintiffs' complaint.

SECOND: That the mortgage of plaintiffs mentioned and described in their first cause of suit in plaintiffs' complaint be adjudged a first lien on the following described real property in Washington County, Oregon, to-wit:

The South half of the following described tract: Being a part of the Isaiah Kelsey D.L.C. No. 41, T. 1 N. R. 3 W. beginning at an iron pipe on the E. line of First Street of the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, extended northward; the said beginning point being also the N. corner of a certain 13.4 acre tract conveyed to E. L. Johnson, by deed recorded at page 90, Book 131, Records of Deeds for Washington County, Oregon, and is reached by beginning at the N. W. corner of the Isaiah Kelsey D.L.C. No. 57 T. 1 N. R. 3 W. and running thence along the N. line of said Kelsey Claim No. 57, and the Isaiah Kelsey Claim No. 41, S. 34 degrees 11' E. 134.8 feet to the E. line of said First Street extended; thence along the E. line of said extended street S. 1 degree 06' W. 234.4 feet to the place of beginning of the herein described tract; running thence along the N. line of said Johnson tract C. 88 degrees 00' E. 433 feet; thence N. 0 degree 59' E. 100.7 feet; thence N. 88 degree 00' W. 433.4 feet to a point on the E. line of said First Street extended; thence along the said E. line of said First Street extended S. 1 degree 06' W. 100.7 feet to the place of beginning containing 1.3 acres.

The tract above described being prior in time and superior in right to the right, title, interest, claims, and demands of the above named defendants and each and all of them and all persons claiming by, through or under them in and to the real property herein above described.

THIRD: For a judgment and decree against the above named defendants, Gust Richardson and Sylvia Richardson for the sum of \$140.50, with interest thereon at the rate of 7% per annum since Sept. 4, 1931, and the further sum of \$100.00 attorney's fees and for plaintiffs' costs and disbursements on the second cause of suit set forth in plaintiffs' complaint.

FOURTH: That the mortgage of said plaintiffs mentioned and described in the second cause of suit set forth in plaintiffs' complaint be adjudged to be a second lien upon the real property hereinabove first mentioned and described, prior in time and superior in right to the right, title, interest, claims and demands of the above named defendants and each and all of them, and all persons claiming by, through or under them, in and to the real property hereinabove described and described in plaintiffs' complaint.

FIFTH: That the mortgage mentioned and described in the first and second causes of suit set forth in plaintiffs' complaint be foreclosed and said defendants and each and all of them be foreclosed of and from all right, title and interest in law or equity in or to the real property hereinabove first described, and that they and all of them and all persons claiming by, through or under them be adjudged and decreed to have no right, title or interest in or lien or claims to or upon said described real property hereinabove just described and south to be foreclosed herein, or any part thereof, and that each and all of them be forever barred and foreclosed, enjoined and precluded from setting out any right, title, claim, lien or interest in or to said real property or any part thereof, excepting only the statutory right of redemption on the part of said defendants, Gust Richardson and Sylvia Richardson; and that said real property above described be sold in the manner prescribed by law and the practices of this court, and that the proceeds from such sale be applied as follows: (a) To the costs and expenses of said sale; (b) To the costs and disbursements of this suit; (c) To the payment to plaintiffs of the sums hereinbefore mentioned and for which judgment is prayed for in the first cause of suit set forth in plaintiffs' complaint; (d) To the payment to plaintiffs of the sums hereinbefore mentioned and for which judgment is prayed for in the second cause of suit set forth in plaintiffs' complaint; (e) That the balance, if any, be paid over to the Clerk of the above entitled court to be disposed of as the court might hereafter direct.

SIXTH: That the plaintiffs be allowed to become purchasers at said

sale. SEVENTH: That the plaintiffs or the purchasers of said sale be granted a writ of assistance to recover possession of the property so purchased. EIGHTH: That the plaintiffs have such other and further relief as to the court may appear just and equitable in the premises. This summons is served upon you by publication thereof in The Beaverton Review, a weekly newspaper printed and published in Beaverton, Washington County, Ore., and of general circulation, pursuant to an order made and entered in the said court and cause on January 17, 1934 by Hon. Geo. R. Hagley, Judge
