(melted); and beat the batter until smooth. Fill well-oiled muffins pans two-thirds full of the mixture. Bake in a hot oven (425 deg. F.) for 20 to 30 minutes. Serve hot. 12 large or 18 small muffins.

Chocolate Muffins

2 cups flour
4 tps. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 pkg. dates (sliced)
1 cup milk
2 tbsps. melted shortening
1 egg

Sift flour, baking powder, salt, sugar and cocoa together. Mix the sliced pitted dates through the flour with the finger tips. Stir in the milk, the beaten egg and the shortening. Pour into greased muffin pans. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 20 minutes. 12 medium or 24 small muffins.
