On Oregon Farms

DALLAS—A six-year-old walnut tree can have a root more than 50 feet long. Polk county walnut and filbert growers are certain of this, because they have seen such a root dug up by Mr. Bates of the Salem district, which was 48 feet long and had been broken off several feet from the end. This root was exhibited at two nut growers' meetings during the past month, one attended by 36 growers, and the other by 66. It effectively demonstrates the need for a large distance between walnuts, as well as other trees, according to County Agent, J. R. Beck.

Lakeview—Four Lake county farmers have ordered 125 pounds of certified Ladak alfalfa seed, practically all of which will be seeded in rows for seed production, reports County Agent V. W. Johnson. Farmers who will plant this seed are George Perkins and Mark Partin, New Pine Creek; Roy Perry, Lakeview, and Frank Ott, Paisley. Lakeview has become very popular as dry land forage, but seed supplies have been limited.

Klamath Falls—Another good cash, soil-building crop may be added to those now produced in Klamath county if pea seed production trials now under way prove satisfactory, says C. A. Henderson, county agent. Twenty-three trial plots of Perfection, Alaskan and Canadian field peas were grown last year by farmers throughout the Klamath project in co-operation with the county agent's office, resulting in good yields of high quality peas. This year 29 growers have contracted to raise seven or eight acres each for an Idaho seed company. Conditions seem very favorable for the production of seed peas in Klamath county, Mr. Henderson says.

Gold Beach—Larry Lucas of Agness is carrying on demonstration trials using superphosphate on alfalfa and various garden crops this year, while O. P. Ferguson, Gold Beach, is planning on making a trial of the effect of potash on some of his pea soil. Both of these men are cooperating in their demonstrations with R. M. Knox, county agent.

Dallas—A complete, standard 4-H club, composed entirely of members of one family is something new in 4-H organizations in Polk county, but such a club has been formed by five children in the Trueaux family of the Bridgeport community, says County Agent J. R. Beck. Joseph, Edith, Edwin, and Anna have enrolled in the Angora goat project under the leadership of Mary Ellen, their older sister, who is also a member of the club.

Roseburg—Six Douglas county growers are seriously considering installing farm irrigation systems for the coming year as the result of preliminary surveys made for them by representatives of the Oregon Extension service. C. E. Marks, Riverdale; Frank Correll, Oakland; and R. W. Hinkley, Garden Valley, are enthusiastic over the prospects of getting water at low cost for alfalfa and ladino clover plantings. J. P. Talbot, Canyonville; Oscar Correll, Oakland, and Clyde Holman, Sutherlin, will install systems if future circumstances permit.

Prineville—Reports that Ladak alfalfa would "go dormant" and make no further growth after the second cutting have been shown to be untrue by observation of Ladak plantings in Crook county this year. An eight-acre field of Ladak on the E. N. Hall farm at Powell Butte made an excellent growth after the second cutting, though it started somewhat slower than other sorts. Growers here would like to use more Ladak seed but so far the seed is so scarce that the price is prohibitive in

most instances. Prices of Grimm and common alfalfa seed quoted here are below a year ago, but Ladak prices are more than double.

Phosphate Boosts Turnip Yield.
Treble phosphate 0-42-0 and an ammoniated phosphate 10-52-0, applied at the rate of 160 pounds to the acre, brought an increase of more than 10 tons of Bortfield turnips per acre on the E. H. Steinmetz farm at Chitwood, Lincoln county, in a demonstration trial in which Mr. Steinmetz cooperated with County Agent M. J. Conklin. This was a 22 per cent increase in yield on the treated over the untreated plots. No appreciable difference could be seen in the plants during the growing season, however, the advantage in the treated plots not showing up until weights were taken.

Sudan Grass Finds Favor.
Sudan grass, recommended to Polk county farmers by County Agent J. R. Beck last spring as a summer pasture crop to meet the emergency feed situation, produced very good pasture, according to many farmers who are enthusiastic over results obtained. Between two and three thousand acres were planted in the county.

Lane Man Grows Ladino Clover.
More than 3000 pounds of threshing machine run Ladino clover seed was produced this year by J. W. Wynn of Junction City from certified blue tag seed obtained by him last year from a Josephine county grower. Mr. Wynn's seed was inspected and passed for certification and County Agent O. S. Fletcher sealed and tagged 30 sacks for him.
