Sauté Your Way to Success Today!

"Life is short; art is long," according to the deathless words of the Roman wisecracks. And while the harried housewife who must fill family vacuums thrice daily, knows plenty about the brevity of time, she might tell the Romans a thing or two about the lengthiness of art. For art, when it appears in the kitchen, is not always long; one of the quickest methods of meal preparation is also one of the best: sauteing.

Sauteing, of course, is just another, newer word for pan-frying, and covers a multitude of—not sins, but successes.

The first thing to realize about pan-frying is, that properly and correctly done, it gives you a completely wholesome and digestible result. (It's the poorly fried foods that have marred its spotless reputation.) The object of frying is to seal up the "pores" or surface of the food, quickly, so that the natural flavors of the food, will be retained inside, during cooking. Correctly fried food is golden and crusty brown on the outside and thoroughly cooked on the inside, without any grease-soaking whatever.

To get a result like this, have the food in right condition for frying; have the correct size of pan; cook it long enough but not too long; and choose the frying agent carefully. Much depends on this choice of shortening. It should give you the results described above, it should prevent sticking to the pan, and should have a "high smoking point" which merely means that it will not smoke when heated to a high temperature. Many cooks use salad oil for this purpose. It can be clarified, and used again and again.

Foods fried should not be too moist on the surface nor too dry. This is why some foods which contain no natural oil of their own are often dipped in egg or milk,

No woman need be told when she wants to serve something that will cook quickly. There are more occasions than space would permit listing. For these numerous occasions, some of these pan-fried good things will be found suitable. Note the frying directions with them.

Pan-Fried Carrots, Lyonnaise
2 cups carrots, cut in strips
1 small onion
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
Parsley to garnish
First cook whole raw carrots (or use left over ones). When cool enough to handle, cut into long thin narrow strips. Chop onion and combine with carrots; add seasoning. In skillet pour enough oil to cover bottom thoroughly; put in carrots and onions and cook, stirring occasionally, until brown.

Frizzled Beef
1/4 lb. dried beef
3 tbsps. salad oil
Pepper to taste
2 tbsps. cornstarch
2 cups milk
Paprika
Shred beef (tear into pieces with fingers). Heat the oil in frying pan; add pepper and cook the beef in it for a few minutes. Sprinkle with cornstarch and cook two or three minutes, stirring well and mixing. Add milk and stir until it boils, then boil 3 minutes. Serve with mashed potatoes, or on toast. Sprinkle with paprika.

Skillet Meal
(Ham, Potatoes & Pineapple)
2 cups cooked ham
2 eggs
1-3 cup dry bread crumbs
3 boiled sweet potatoes
1 tsp. prepared mustard
6 slices canned pineapple
1/4 cup dark corn syrup
Pinch of powdered cloves
Mix ham (chopped and previously cooked) with bread crumbs, slightly beaten eggs, and mustard. Shape into patties with hands, making about six. Pour oil into skillet—about 6 tablespoonsful—and when hot, put in canned pineapple slices; brown them on both sides. Remove pineapple from pan and thoroughly brown the ham patties in the same way. Lay the slices of pineapple in another skillet or shallow baking dish. Put a ham patty on top each slice. Now cut sweet potatoes, previously parboiled (or left-over) cut into length-wise slices, into the remaining hot oil in skillet. Pour over them the syrup and powdered cloves and brown until glazed. Put these around the ham patties and pour about a cup of pineapple juice over all. Put all this in a moderate oven and let heat through.

Sauteed Bananas
Peel bananas, cut in halves and then through middle. Dip lightly in flour and then brown in a skillet which has just enough oil in it to cover bottom. Brown both sides.

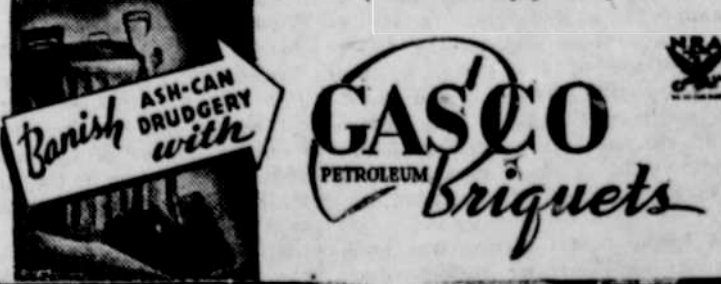
