Silently Passing

WILLIAM GLIME HAGER

William Glime Hager died Monday at the age of 88 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Nora McCourt.

He had long been a resident of Hillsboro, and was one of the founders of the General Ransom post of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Born in Laporte, Ind., February 24, 1848, Mr. Hager saw 18 months' service in the civil war. He enlisted October 14, 1864 in company D, 17th Iowa infantry. He married Cleora E. Junks in Iowa on July 4, two years after the centennial observance of Independence day, and ten years later they came to Oregon. They settled on a farm near Hillsboro, where in 1915, his wife died.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. McCourt, and a son, Herbert O. Hager of Butte, Montana.

The funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. The concluding ceremony was conducted by the American Legion at the grave side.

STRANGE TALE BACK OF NEW GASOLINE

In fact Railway Express Agency, in charge of it, classed it under the heading of large value shipments, bullion, etc. Vigilance was not relaxed even when it reached the west coast, for there it was transported by armored car to General Petroleum headquarters.

The shipment arrived in Los Angeles shortly after the famous Torture Test cars which have been familiar on the Pacific Coast for several weeks past. These cars had just completed a transcontinental run without radiators, the last of a long series of grinding tests made over the past three years which has resulted in the discovery of a secret formula from which had been produced the treasured gallon of gasoline. It had been sent from the New York headquarters of the Socony-Vacuum Company, of which General is the Pacific Coast affiliate, and no chances were allowed to be taken on either the formula or the new fuel sample going astray.

Tells Aims The entire episode, as well as yesterday's introduction of General Mobilgas to the Pacific Coast motorists, was the outgrowth of one of the most interesting stories in the history of the petroleum industry, according to A. H. DePriest, vice-president in charge of sales for General Petroleum Corporation. "Some years ago," he said, "General Motors, together with those
