NECESSARY TO REPORT KILLING HOGS

The past week agents from the Bureau of Internal Revenue have been in the vicinity checking up on those who have been killing hogs in the immediate past to see if they have paid the "processing tax" that has been levied by our supposedly benevolent Uncle with the striped trousers.

Inquiry developed that these agents claim that anyone who has killed any hogs since last November 5 is required by law to report their actions to the Bureau of Internal Revenue in Portland. This bureau is supposed to have collected $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs weight for all hogs killed in November, 1 lb for those killed in December or January, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb for those killed in February, and $\frac{1}{4}$ lb for those killed in March and thereafter.

It would seem to behoove everyone who has done any hog killing to make their report to the Bureau. Certain exemptions are allowed but the report MUST be made. At the time the report is filed the exemptions can be ascertained.

SHADYBROOK CLUBS ENTER FOURTH YEAR

Having the only 4-H club irrigation project in the state, and having the only club member in Oregon who is a grange master, the Shadybrook 4-H clubs are entering their fourth year of club work with the prospect of doing better than ever. D. M. McDougall, Hillsboro, Route 3, is again leading the dairy club, which this year has ten members carrying 12 projects, and the poultry club with eleven members carrying 14 projects. Last year at the County 4-H Club Fair Frances and Ruth McDougall, and Herbert and Stanley Schneider placed first and fourth in their division with their two demonstration teams. LeRoy Mills and Charles Kay for the second consecutive year placed first at both county and State fairs in the livestock demonstration contest.

Last fall for the second time the Shadybrook Dairy club won first on its club booth at the county fair.

The club irrigation project is making an excellent growth this year, with ladino clover, alfalfa sweet clover, and crimson clover making a good showing.
