On Oregon Farms

Cordon-Seed flax, never before given a thorough trial on any of the high altitude land in Gilliam county, is being tried out this year by Edward Walbaum of the Igo district and a farmer near Mayville. Each of these men obtained a half-bushel of seed through the county agent's office.

Hillsboro—John Thornburgh, who began irrigating his ranch on Gales Creek in 1932 by taking gravity water from a small creek for 12 acres and increased it to 52 acres in 1933, is now making plans for 100 acres to be put under water. County Agent W. F. Cyrus and Art King, extension specialist in soils from O.S.C., who made a feasibility survey of the project for Mr. Thornburgh recently, believe that with a low dam and approximately one-half mile of flume he can put water for the entire acreage in the flume he already has.

Oregon City—Certified White Rose potatoes are being planted extensively by Clackamas county farmers this year as a result of information that this variety is in great demand in California where it is used to plant approximately 90 per cent of the potato acreage, reports County Agent J. J. Inskeep. This variety is popular, he says, because it stands rougher treatment than the Burbank and yields about 100 sacks more per acre in the irrigated sections of California. While it is of poorer quality than the Burbank, people will not pay enough to compensate for the difference in yield according to Inskeep.

Dallas—Extensive applications of sodium chlorate for killing Canada thistle are being made in Polk county this year, according to Co. Agent J. R. Beck who reports that twenty farmers have purchased a total of 2800 pounds of this chemical this spring.

The Cook's Nook

What to Sup on Sunday night
Does Sunday night supper at your house remind you of a remnant-counter? Sometimes supper on a Sunday night is just a too-familiar review of what was dinner on a Sunday noon! That lone chicken wing, that half-filled dish of vegetables or the salad nobody liked: are these to be the ignoble fare every week?

Sunday is rightly a day of rest. Custom decrees the main meal of the day be eaten at noon. But there are, to the knowing, a few certain dishes that require less work than the proverbial rolling-off-a-log and that can make your Sunday night supper worth coming home to eat.

Save the left-overs, of course—but save them until Monday or even Tuesday has enlivened your wit sufficiently to make clever use of them. On Sunday night try a quick-dish that will make a one-course menu and abandon the rummage-sale method of supping!

Three-in-One Sandwiches

(A quick but novel sweet sandwich)
Spread one slice of lightly buttered bread with peanut butter. Cover with a layer of chopped dates. Spread a second slice of buttered bread with currant or cranberry jelly. Put slices together in pairs.

Savory Eggs on Toast

(A hot creamed dish for cool nights)
1 tbsp. minced onion
3 tbsps. salad oil
2 tbsps. cornstarch
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. paprika
2 cups milk
6 hard boiled eggs
1 (2 oz.) jar pimiento
6 slices French Toast
Cook onion in salad oil until it is yellow, but not brown. Add cornstarch, nutmeg, salt and paprika, stir until well blended, cook 2 minutes. Add milk gradually, stirring constantly. Cook until smooth and thickened. Boil 3 minutes. Cut eggs into quarters lengthwise and pimiento into strips. Arrange eggs on toast, pour sauce over all, and garnish with strips of pimiento.

Marshmallow Whip

(A delicious emergency dessert)
1/4 lb. marshmallows
1/2 pkg. dates
1 doz. lady fingers or sponge cake
1 cup nutmeats
1/2 pt. heavy cream
1/4 tsp. vanilla
Quarter pitted dates and marshmallows with wet scissors. Break nutmeats into coarse pieces. Whip 1/4 cup of cream until stiff; add vanilla or 1 tablespoon sherry flavoring, and fold in dates, marshmallows and nutmeats. Chill in refrigerator for at least an hour. Line individual serving dishes with lady fingers which have been cut in half, or use strips of sponge cake. Fill with marshmallow mixture and cover with remaining cream which has been whipped. Decorate with nutmeats. Serves 6. This whip is also delicious served in Cream Puff shells.

Let Refrigerator Help

Certain appropriate dishes for Sunday night require a little advance preparation, but are none the less easy, since the refrigerator does the work. Prepare the dish right after dinner or while the dinner is cooking, and put it in the refrigerator. Then, when supper time it will come almost as a surprise!

Here are two good refrigerator-made salads which may form the main dish of the supper.

Frozen Cheese Savory

(Good for party-fare too)
1 1/2 cups cream cheese
2 tbsps. salad oil
1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. paprika
1/2 cup cream
1/2 cup pecans
1/2 cup green pepper
1/2 cup pimiento
1/2 cup boiled dressing
Cream the cheese and blend with salad oil, salt and paprika. Add chopped nuts, green pepper and pimiento. Blend with salad dressing and fold in cream (whipped). Put in trays of mechanical refrigerator and freeze for about 4 hours. To serve cut in squares and serve on watercress or lettuce, or on cubes of lemon gelatine.

Frozen Fruit Salad

(Just combine and freeze)
1 (No. 1) can grapefruit
2 cups mixed fruits
1 cup chopped almonds
1 cup diced celery
1 cup mayonnaise
1 1/2 cups heavy cream
1 cup dates sliced
Drain canned fruits, thoroughly, cut in small pieces, combine fruits, celery and almonds (or other nutmeats). Whip the cream and add to mayonnaise, then add to fruits. Pack in trays of mechanical refrigerator or in mold in mixture of ice and salt and freeze about 4 hours. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise. This makes about 12 servings; halve recipe to make 6 servings.

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Modern Family is Satisfied With Two-Vegetable Dinner

Scientific Meal Planning Assures Full Quota of Food Elements

THERE was a time, not so long ago at that, when the housewife felt it necessary that the principal meal of the day should always include three or four, or on special occasions even five, vegetable dishes.

Tables groaned under the weight of vegetables—potatoes, corn, beets, tomatoes and carrots—and the strange part is that everyone accepted this as a matter of course.

Today, the housewife with one eye cocked toward the family budget and a wealth of dietetic and culinary advice at her fingertips, has learned how to limit the vegetable courses to two or possibly three dishes, and still meet all the demands of health and appetite.

Science has taught her that it is possible to provide all the vitamins, calories and other food elements needed by active people without stuffing them until they

resembled the proverbial Thanksgiving turkey.

But along with the reduction in the quantity of foods served has come an added responsibility for the quality of the dishes. The few vegetables should be served more attractively and with flavor more in mind, than were the four or five dishes of grandmother's day.

In France, methods of seasoning that give added zest to vegetable dishes have long been familiar to all experienced cooks and one of the seasoning agents most frequently used for this purpose is sugar. A small amount—just a dash—helps to restore the natural sweetness which the vegetables lose after being picked, and when two or more vegetables are cooked together it tends to blend their contrasting flavors.

A few housewives have long used a little sugar in cooking certain vegetables, but not until recently has its use been general with green vegetables as a whole.

The sugar has another value recognized by science, but not so widely known to housewives. It is a quickly assimilated energy food which becomes available for muscular use within a short time after it is eaten.

Thus, with this new trick of seasoning, not only is the flavor enhanced, but the food value of the dish as well.

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
