That Butterscotch Flavor

Butterscotch in all its guises is a favorite of long standing. So simple is it to make, it is no wonder the original confection has been adapted to dozens of uses. Butterscotch is always made by heating butter and sugar together until the sugar is caramelized to a pale brown color. This mixture may have milk or other ingredients added to it, as for the Caramel Apples and the Butterscotch Peach Tart Pie, or it may be stirred into rice or tapioca cooked in milk as in the Rice Butterscotch recipe that follows:

Rice Butterscotch

1/3 cupful of uncooked rice
1 1/2 cupful of scalded milk
2 tbsps. (1/4 cube) of butter
1 cupful of brown sugar
1/4 tsp. salt

Wash the rice very thoroughly. Have the milk scalding in a double boiler. Add the rice to the milk, cover, and let cook until nearly tender. In a saucepan melt the butter, add the brown sugar and salt, and stir over a slow fire until the sugar is melted but not burned. Stir into the rice and let finish cooking. Pour into molds, cool, and serve with either plain or whipped cream. Delicious.

Apple pie, apple dumplings, apple slobber, apple sauce, apple jam! What shall we make? All of them or any, but there is one way you must try. Caramel apples are luscious beyond comparison.

Your tooth goes through the smooth, delicious candy coating, and there is the ripe fruit. Two taste sensations at once! Evaporated milk, you will find, greatly assists in producing fine candy texture.

Caramel Apples

2 lbs. of sugar
Scant cupful of white corn syrup
2 2/3 cupful of evaporated milk
Put sugar, syrup and two-thirds cupful of milk in a large, heavy kettle. Stir to blend well. Heat slowly until sugar is melted, then boil briskly to a thick syrup. Add remainder of milk slowly, keeping mixture boiling briskly and boil to firm ball stage (242° F.).

Select small apples, free from blemishes. Wash and dry thoroughly and stick on wooden skewers. Dip apples in caramel mixture. Twirl to get rid of surplus coating and make smooth. Stand apples in holes in heavy board or in some receptacle that will permit drying without marring coating. Be sure skewers fit tightly in holes.

If coating becomes too hard for dipping add a little evaporated milk and reheat. The caramel should be kept quite hot so that the coating will not be too heavy. Yield: Enough coating for 15 to 20 apples.

Children adore to help when the apples are dipped in the candy. You are warned, though, that your handiwork may never leave the kitchen. It may be devoured on the spot.

Butterscotch Peach Tart Pie

Line a pie tin with flaky pastry and cover the bottom with fresh or canned halves of peaches, cut side up. Make a sauce of 2 tablespoonsful of butter, 3 tablespoonsful of flour, 1/4 cupful of brown sugar, 4 tablespoonsful of maple flavored syrup, and the juice of half a lemon. Heat together just long enough to blend well, then fill the peach halves with this butterscotch mixture. Cover the pie with strips of pastry laid lattice fashion, and bake in a hot oven (450 degrees) for 10 minutes, then reduce the heat to 375 degrees and bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until peaches are tender and crust is nicely browned.

Caramel Pudding

1 can sweetened condensed milk
Boiling water

To caramelize, put the can of sweetened condensed milk in a kettle of boiling water and keep it at the boiling point for three hours. Make sure that the can is kept covered with water. Remove from the water and chill thoroughly. When you open the can you have a delicious caramel pudding. It may be served in sherbet glasses, topped with nuts and whipped

To make one delicious variation, blend the caramelized milk to 1/4 cup hot coffee, beating until smooth. Chop 1/2 cup pecan nut meats and add. Pour into sherbet glasses, and chill. This may be garnished with whipped cream. It serves six.

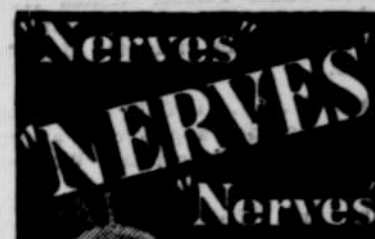
