The Cook's Nook

Cook Is Moved to Make Some Rimes As Gypsy Days Promote Good Times

Let incorrigible campers bring forth all the hampers; pack up the bacon and steak. Oh, stay not to bicker, each ardent picnicer; procure now the sandwich and cake. Let no wit-blanket piker disturb plans of his, to roam and range widely and far. Let relatives grumble—pile them all in the rumble—and start on the road in your car!

Take some first-aid supplies please, (and netting for flies please); make certain there's plenty of wood. Prepare enough luncheon, to fill up the truncheon; and be sure that the victuals are good. The foods here suggested, and the recipes (tested) will help every mother and wife. Don't let these rhymes spoil your pleasure; go ahead, spend your leisure—to enjoy the free gypsy life!

Camper's Sandwiches

Moisten finely cut dates with orange juice or other suitable liquid. Add chopped nuts, (or peanut butter). Spread on rounds of buttered brown bread. Put slices together in pairs and cut in halves. One-half package of dates and ½ cup nuts make a dozen sandwiches.

Picnic Spice Cake

This is a moist cake, not apt to crack in packing and will keep fresh for a long period because it is made with syrup.

½ cup shortening
1½ cups brown sugar
2 eggs
¾ cup sour milk
¼ cup dark corn syrup
3 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
½ tsp. allspice
½ tsp. soda
2 tps. baking powder
1 tsp. mace
2 tps. ginger
1 tsp. nutmeg
½ tsp. cloves
2 tps. cinnamon

Mix brown sugar and shortening thoroughly. Add unbeaten eggs, one at a time beating thoroughly after each addition. Stir in sour milk and syrup. Sift together dry ingredients; cut and fold into first mixture. Bake in layers 25 minutes in moderate oven (375° F.). Cool and put layers together with

BANK LOANS AND BUSINESS RECOVERY

Official Describes Efforts of Reserve Banks to Bring Out Deserving Borrowers—Present Situation Typical

Apologies of the part that an expansion of business loans by banks occupies in the early stages of the business recovery which is now gaining headway, a Federal Reserve Bank official recently gave an interesting review of the experiences of his institution in this connection. In 1932 the Federal Reserve Banks were empowered by law to make direct loans to individuals in unusual circumstances when they had been unable to obtain loans from a commercial bank, he pointed out.

From the middle of 1932 to the end of 1933 there were 1,286 applicants for loans at the New York Federal Reserve Bank under this law. The great majority of these applications proved on examination to be for funds for capital purposes, which are properly supplied as an investment in the business, or else were mortgage loans or others unclassifiable as commercial.

Only Fourteen Qualify

Only 250, or less than 20 per cent, were of the type which merited detailed investigation. The amount involved was \$9,525,000. After further study of these, the Federal Reserve Bank was forced to turn down the applications of 236, finally offering credit in the sum of \$1,417,000 to 14 prospective borrowers. Of this amount, only \$806,000 was actually loaned, more than one-half of which was still outstanding many months later. Two of the borrowers went into receivership.

"Since it was the special endeavor of the Federal Reserve Bank to make every possible loan under the emergency provisions of the amendment, and since their best efforts resulted in the extension of so small a sum as to have no effect on the total volume of commercial loans, it is a reasonable assumption that eligible borrowers entitled to bank credit are being provided for by the commercial banks," says the American Bankers Association Journal in commenting on this episode.

It is characteristic, as shown by studies of past business cycles, for changes in the volume of commercial bank credit to follow behind either contraction or expansion of business activity, says a financial writer in the New York Times. This was manifest recently in England's recent recovery where there was a lag between increased business and increased commercial loans.

Picnic Stew

There'll be no "stewing" over a camp fire to make this stew. Prepare it at home in a casserole, cover tightly to keep hot and your main dish will be all ready to pack and carry.

1 small onion
1 small green pepper
2 cups tomatoes
2 cups cooked rice
½ tsp. salt
¼ tsp. paprika
1 read crumbs

Chop onion and shred green pepper and put in frying pan with about 3 tablespoons frying fat (butter would be delicious), and cook until onion browns. Add tomatoes and seasonings. Cook until most of moisture has evaporated. Mix with cooked rice and place in an oiled casserole or baking dish. Cover top with crumbs and bake for 20 minutes in a moderate oven.

Hints for Outdoor Cooking

To cook several foods in one pot, tie each separate food in parchment paper and flavors will not mix.

To broil a steak over a campfire use the new steak tongs, or a wire broiler; before broiling, rub the whole steak with salad oil so that it will brown evenly and stay juicy.

Instead of "open face" pies for the picnic, put appropriate filling into thin pastry, roll up the pasty and bake. Make this way, contents will not "leak out". A specially good combination is made with 1 cup strained cranberry sauce, 1½ tablespoons lemon juice, rind of ½ lemon, 2 tps. water, 1 cup sliced dates, 1 cup seedless raisins, and ½ cup chopped nuts. Mixture, except nuts, is cooked until blended, nuts are added, and is then used for filling the pastry, or for filled cookies.

Pancakes made from prepared pancake flour, cooked over the open fire and served with syrup and coffee make an excellent out-door meal.

After broiling bacon strips on sticks until nearly done, put a marshmallow on the end of the stick, wrap bacon around it and toast until marshmallow is done. New but good combination.

The deep sectioned frying pans are very convenient for out door cooking, since different foods may be cooked in the pan at the same time.
