MORE RELEASED FROM LOCAL BANK

The Bank of Beaverton has been busy during the last few days paying out their recent release of 20% of the saving deposits that were tied up when the bank went on a restricted basis more than a year ago.

The recent release makes a total of 35% of the saving department deposits that have been released to date. First there was a 5% release, then a few months ago a 10% release, and now this 20% release brings the total up to a little more than a third of the deposits in that department.

Though no definite date has been set, the management expects to be able to release an additional 15% in the commercial department to bring that total up to 20% release.
