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Fifty-Seven Graduate From B.H.S.

Marylhurst Scholarship Is Awarded to Catherine Markovich

TWO CUPS ARE GIVEN

High School Orchestra Plays For Processional and Recessional

Fifty seven students were graduated from Beaverton High school at the Commencement exercises held at the school auditorium Friday evening. The auditorium was crowded with friends and relatives coming to see the graduates; many of those present were forced to stand up because of lack of seating room.

The Processional march, "Scented Roses", was played by the High school orchestra, directed by Mrs. Georgia Snyder. The graduating class marched into the auditorium and up onto the platform, where they seated themselves. The girls wore long, white or pastel frocks and corsages of Cecil Brunner Roses and sweet peas, while the boys wore dark suits with roses in their lapels.

Most of the speeches were furnished by the students. Marvin Stalder, Senior Class President, welcomed those present in his talk on "Commencement". Margaret West mentioned several forms of education available to the graduates, in "Our Future Education." Margaret Dickman discussed "Why We Are Graduating". Kenneth Taylor discussed the problems confronting the graduate, in his address, "We Face the Future".

Rev. Charles Clarke gave the invocation.

The high school glee club and the Glee club quartette sang. The Class of '34, itself, sang the class song, "Here's to the Class of '34", which was written by Betty Buchanan. Miss Buchanan accompanied them on the piano.

I. R. Metzler, Superintendent of Beaverton schools, presented the class honors. Torch Honor pins were given to Jessica Kinsey, Catherine Markovich, Imogene Smith, Douglas Taylor, Kenneth Taylor, Margaret West and Tom Wilson. The Torch Honor cup which is given every year by the underclassmen of the Torch Honor society to the senior graduating with the most points, went to Kenneth Taylor, who had amassed 158 points in his four school years. At least 110 points are required for a student to graduate as a Torch Honor member.

Catherine Markovich received a scholarship to Marylhurst College. She has the added honor of being the first student from Beaverton High school to receive a scholarship from this college. The selections of Pacific University and Linfield University for the scholarships they were offering, were not received in time to be announced Friday evening.

Vernon Bronkey received the athletic cup, given to the member of the class most outstanding in the qualities of all-round athletic ability and good sportsmanship.

After the presentation of diplomas by Dr. J. R. Talbert, chairman of the school board, the class marched off the platform to the strains of the recessional, "At Sundown" played by the orchestra, down to the main floor where they received the congratulations of their friends.

The count at that time showed Martha Lehman, 32,000; Aline Lehman, 25,750; Willie Jean Riley, 25,750; Isabelle Wallis, 25,000; Aline Boswell, 12,500; Genevieve Johnson, 9,750; Mary Jane Junor, 9,000; and Betsy Tollefson, 7,250.

Voting will continue until 11:00 p.m. the evening of June first at the Coronation program. An exceptionally interesting program is planned to be followed by dancing to Greenwald's music. A refreshment booth featuring ices, soft drinks, candies, etc., will be in charge of the patronesses. Each ten cents entitles the purchaser to one hundred votes.

All High school students and younger boys and girls are entitled to admission to the Rose Festival events by purchasing the Junior button, which also entitles them to 250 votes for their choice for Queen. The adult buttons carry 1,000 votes.

CLUB MEMBERS PLAN TO ATTEND SCHOOL

About 45 club members from Washington county will attend the 4-H club summer school, June 11 to 23. The 4-H club delegation will leave Hillsboro and Beaverton by bus for the Union depot in Portland where they will get on the special 4-H club train for Corvallis. Some 4-H club members won scholarships to the summer school at the State Fair last fall. Others won scholarships offered by organizations and business firms in the county, still others are going on scholarships financed by their own club and others are going at their own expense. Cost of the two weeks session is kept at a minimum. \$12 covers the cost of room, board, and all incidental expenses.

SEED CORN SOLD BY FOUR-H MEMBERS

Five and one-fourth tons of Minnesota 13 seed corn have been sold by 4-H club members of Washington County this spring for \$250. This is the first year that there has been any organized attempt made to sell the corn raised by 4-H corn club members in this county. Seed dealers and farm organizations have co-operated to buy and advertise this seed. All 4-H corn sold was raised for the Commercial National bank corn contest. This contest, which was started four years ago and is now entering its fifth year, requires that each 4-H club member competing plant at least one full acre of Minnesota 13 corn. The bank has supplied the seed at no cost to the club members and requires only that 25 ears be exhibited at the fall corn show held at Hillsboro in the lobby of the bank. Seed for the next year's contest is purchased from the club member whose combined field score, exhibit rating and germination test is highest. Eighty percent of the corn sold this spring germinated over ninety-six per cent and all of it germinated ninety three per cent or better.

NEAR TIME FOR FRUIT FLY SPRAY

Cherry fruit flies have been found in emergence cages near Corvallis, Rickteall, and Amity, according to S. C. Jones, entomologist at the Oregon Experiment Station. Observations in Washington County indicate that the flies have not yet made their appearance here, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. The appearance of the flies here is ordinarily a few days later than at the valley points. As soon as these flies emerge, all varieties of cherries, as well as interplanted trees and brush along fence rows, should be sprayed at once. Because of danger from excess spray residue, growers are cautioned to avoid heavy spraying. All that is necessary is to get a light sprinkling of poison bait on the leaves of the cherry and other nearby trees. From 1 pint to 1 quart per tree should be sufficient. The following materials should be used in the spray: Lead arsenate, 1/2 pint; molasses, 2 quarts; water, 10 gal.

County Court Explains Use Of Funds

Letter Written Refuting Allegations of Niggardiness in Relief

RESOURCES LIMITED

Must Be Careful in Using Funds Not to Run Entirely Out

Dear Editor:

Upon several occasions within the past six weeks it has been brought to the attention of the County Court that there is certain dissatisfaction with the administration of County Relief Funds. This dissatisfaction is founded in allegations that the Court is unnecessarily niggardly in the dispensing of such funds, in other words the Court is being accused of being "hard boiled" in this respect.

In this statement reference is made only to those relief funds which are budgeted in the County Budget and which are raised by direct taxation upon real property in this County, and no reference is made herein to State or Federal funds which are handled through facilities provided by the State Relief Committee. Much of this dissatisfaction arises from the fact that many of the complainants do not realize that there is an end to public funds. They do not know, or do not care, that the resources available to the County Court are limited and that the amount of relief funds provided are measured by the taxpayers' ability to provide such funds.

For 1934 the sum of \$12,000 was budgeted for relief purposes and the manner in which this fund is being depleted may be shown by the expenditures for the first four months of this year as follows:

January	\$928.18
February	809.52
March	1,099.60
April	1,033.69

If the expenditures are continued at approximately the same rate in the remaining eight months of the year the relief funds will be virtually exhausted and when those funds are exhausted our funds for the relief must cease for there is no emergency fund of sufficient size to assume the relief expenditures.

When an individual has \$1.00 in his pocket then \$1.00 is all he can spend, and when an item in the County Budget provides a specific amount for a specific purpose this Court will not exceed that amount. The County Budget is intended to serve a purpose. It sets forth the various amounts which may be spent for the purposes set forth therein and upon the County Court falls the duty of conforming to that budget in all respects. The laws of this State and the oath of office which the members of the Court take indicates their duty and this County Court will perform that duty and protect the trust which the people have placed in it, regardless of the consequences. If and when the County Budget Committee sees fit to increase this item for relief and when and if the taxpayers of the County see fit to approve it, then and not before will there be sufficient money available to meet the demands that are now being made upon this Court.

The Court is stretching the available funds in an effort to make them reach as far as possible, and a concentration is being made upon those items not furnished by State or Federal Funds. Every effort is being made to assist all worthy cases, but it cannot be expected that this Court will launch on a relief program which will result in expenditures greater than the amount allowed in the County Budget, for there falls upon the Court a duty to protect the taxpayer as well as a duty to care for the needy.
