HAY GROWERS HOLD MEETINGS IN COUNTY

Hay growers to the number of nearly 50 decided Wednesday evening, at meetings in Hillsboro and Verboort, that the outlook for a fair price for the 1934 hay crop is more favorable than many think. Figures submitted by the growers indicated that the carry-over of old hay on the farms is less than usual. While the new crop is heavy, it is not abnormally large.

Growers present agreed, reports county agent Cyrus, that under existing circumstances, farmers need not be too anxious to unload their hay at low prices at this time. Market conditions at present do not warrant a high price but the growers agreed that a fair price should be demanded. For number one red clover, they agreed to ask \$10 per ton baled in the field with \$1 more if it is stored in the barn. For vetch and oat hay they agreed upon a price of \$11 per ton in the field.

Eastern Oregon, it was reported, does not have as large a crop as usual. While there may be some hay to be shipped from certain sections east of the mountains, there are other sections there that have no hay and are going to require some. Conditions would indicate that probably the greater part of the eastern Oregon crop will be consumed in Eastern Oregon, it was said. Livestock in drought stricken areas are going to have to have some feed. Where this feed will come from no one at the present time is able to say. Another favorable possibility is some betterment in butterfat prices which might indicate a later demand for Willamette Valley hay. Growers expressed themselves as believing that the supply of hay on hand with 1934 crop was no more than would be readily moved and cleaned up in the course of a normal winter.

STRIKE HAS EFFECT ON ORE. BUSINESS

The waterfront strike which has plagued Portland and other Pacific coast seaports since May 9th, had a marked influence on volume of business activity last month according to the June issue of Business Survey, published and distributed by Commonwealth, Inc., of Portland. The Commonwealth Index of Portland business was at 60 of a computed normal, against 80 in April and 61 in May, 1933.

Industrial activity was somewhat curtailed due to inability of manufacturers, particularly lumber mills to make shipments. Lumber stocks at tidewater mills grew rapidly during the month until lack of piling space dictated curtailed production. The market for Oregon lumber continued to be quiet and there is little in the outlook suggestive of awakened lumber demand.

The bright side of the picture, says Business Survey, is the excellent prospect for Oregon agriculture. Both fruit and grains are doing well in most sections of the state and the possibility of satisfactory prices this fall are enhanced by shortage in other parts of the country. David Eccles, editor of Business Survey, thinks the business outlook for this fall is considerably more optimistic than a year ago, provided labor difficulties do not result in further contraction in buying power and uncertainty. So long as the future is cloudy, business will hesitate to make future commitments, so vital to progress against depression.

Albany—Twelve acres of corn and 15 acres of ladino clover on the F. D. Kropf farm of Linn county will be irrigated this year by water pumped through 2200 feet of concrete pipe which was manufactured on the farm by means of a home-made machine, reports County Agent F. C. Mullen. The system is to be installed underground with water to be pumped against pressure.

STUDENTS WORKING WAY IN COLLEGE

At least \$40,000 was earned by men and women during the past school year from jobs obtained through the student employment offices at Oregon State college, according to the annual report made by those in charge. Most of this was from more or less steady positions where students earned either board or room or both, though much was from more than 2000 calls for part-time labor.

Men were willing to undergo a great degree of privation to remain in college, just as many parents in many instances made exceptional sacrifices to keep children there, the report of Mrs. Lula Howard, men's employment secretary shows.

Many men batched, even after some board and room could be had for \$15 a month, as they said they got by on \$7 a month cash outlay by getting farm produce from home. Several mothers co-operated in operating a house for their children, taking turns cooking, and in bringing supplies from home.
