PLANS FOR SHEEP SHOW COMPLETED

Plans for the 1st Annual Forest Grove National Bank Sheep Show are now completed, with the event scheduled for Saturday, July 21. John Thornburgh, president of the bank, has made arrangements to entertain all the exhibitors and 4-H Sheep Club Leaders as his guests at the noon luncheon. Parents and friends are welcome to attend the luncheon which will be served by the local grange for a moderate charge.

B. W. Rodenwald, professor of animal husbandry at the Oregon State College, will be the official judge of the show, and will talk at the luncheon on the management of sheep on Washington county farms.

Frank Brown, prominent sheep breeder from whom many of the boys purchased their stock, will talk to the boys on the breeding of fine sheep. Antone Evers, Forest Grove, will loan two sheep to be used for the fitting demonstration.

Each exhibitor will be given an exhibitors ribbon as soon as his sheep are entered. Place ribbons and premiums for the first five places will be awarded in each of the three classes, breeding ewes, yearling ewes and ewe lambs. Any boy may show as many sheep in a single class as he wishes but can take only one place.

In sponsoring the sheep contest, Mr. Thornburgh has started a new line of club work for Washington County. Two sheep clubs have been formed and several boys are in the contest as individuals. Cecil Heynderickx, Route 1, Cornelius, is leading the Verboort Sheep Club of eight members. J. L. Smith, Banks Rt. 2, is leading the Bald Mountain 4-H club with six club members entered in the Bank contest.

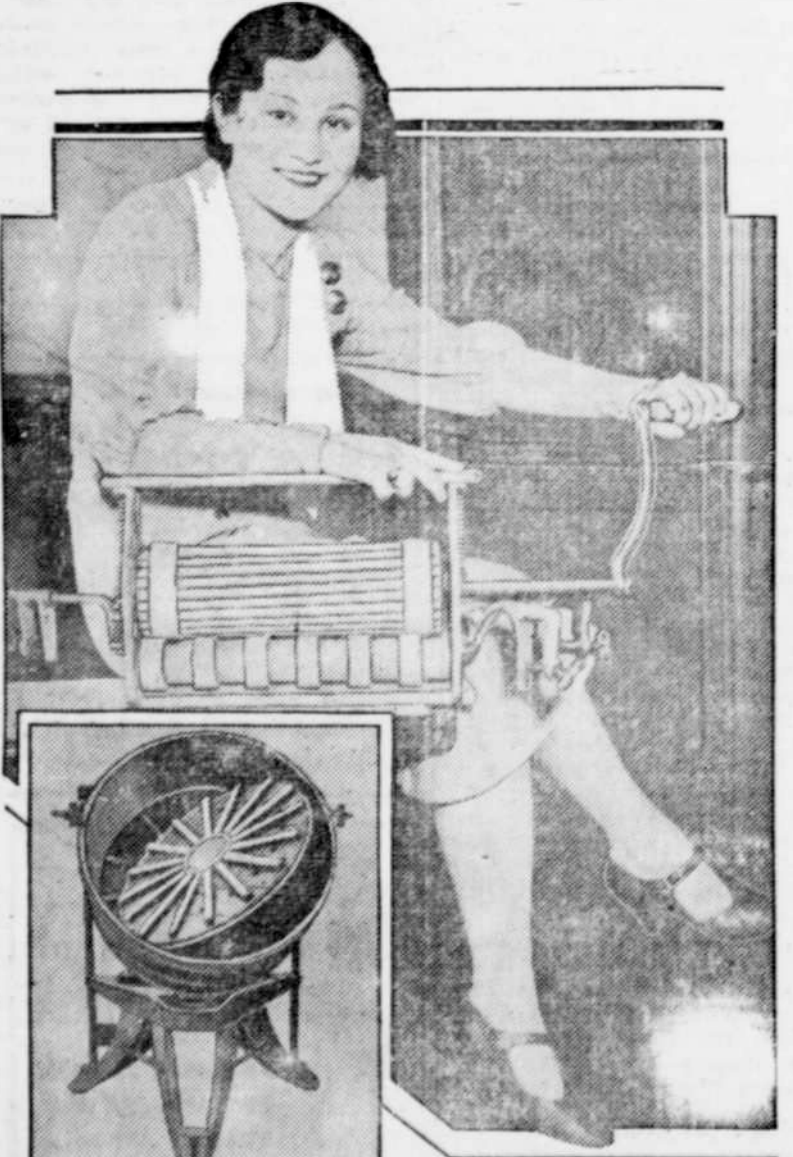

Oh, Mr. Ripley, These Are Washers!
Who Knows Any Older Still in Use?



Believe it or not, this pretty girl is holding, not a wringer, but a washing machine!
Two bachelor brothers recently sold the Akron Times-Press they wash their clothes with it every week. It was made in 1875. Clamps fasten it to the top of a tub. Springs maintain pressure between the rollers as the clothes are worked back and forth by the big handle.
Hard on buttons? Well, yes, the bachelors admit, but what of that, if it serves to keep women out of their house, they ask.
The up-ended tub is a washer, too. It was found in Missouri recently, still in steady use. The tub stands level on the tripod base. There are raised ribs in the bottom of the tub. That "wagon-wheel spoke" disc lies on the clothes, rib side down. The poor operator seizes a handle and rotates the tub to and fro on the tripod. The clothes rub against the ribbed bottom and top. Washing machine design has advanced far since the days when these devices were hailed as real new labor-savers.
Who knows of ancient washers different from these? According to Joseph R. Bonnen, 80 East Jackson boulevard, Chicago, who is compiling records of old household appliances, these are two of the oldest known.

HOMEMADE TAMALES
2 pounds of boiling beef
1 1/2 pounds of pork steak
Water to cover
Corn meal to thicken liquid until hard to stir
Salt to taste
Cayenne to taste
Ripe olives

Boil meat together until it will fall to pieces, remove from broth, season broth well. (The corn requires more salt than the broth alone will.) Stir in meat, shredded meat, olives, and cook, stirring, for 1/2 hour or longer. Spread on a corn husk, wrap, tie with raffia. Serve with catsup. If tamales are liked hot, add cayenne to catsup, but do not put too much in with the corn meal. Serves six.
