PARASITES OF CODLING MOTH LIBERATED

Hurried to their destination by fast airplane express, 3000 insect parasites of the codling moth are now at work in Oregon, after being liberated by Oregon State college entomologists in the Willamette valley, Hood River and southern Oregon.

These parasites, known technically as *Ascogaster carpocapsae*, were reared in the government laboratories in New Jersey, having been collected in western Asia, the original home of the apple.

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ADMISSION TO CO. FAIR TO BE FREE

The Washington County Fair Board, R. M. Banks, president, C. D. Minton, vice-president and manager, and Henry Hesse, treasurer, is rapidly whipping into shape the most gigantic effort that has ever been put forth for the county fair in Washington county.

That the people in Washington County desire a county fair is evidenced by the hearty co-operation which is being given the board by the granges, the farmers union, the 4-H club, and the merchants and business men throughout the county. Already the granges have signed up to as great an extent as ever before, and in addition there will be a magnificent exhibit by the farmers union, all of the locals in the county combining to make this a great exhibit.

Lively programs for each day have been arranged beginning with the 4-H club and the future farmers for Thursday afternoon. This will be followed by a band concert in the evening and a dance in the big pavilion.

Friday is to be known as Farmers Union Day, and the Farmers Union have decided to hold a big picnic dinner at the noon hour, which will be followed by a championship baseball game beginning at 2:30 between the Cedar Mill local baseball team and the Blooming local baseball team. This game is the end of the series for the summer, and these are the two high teams. Therefore the winning team will be awarded a pennant by the county committee of the Farmers' Union. The evening will witness the second trial for the milk maids contest which will be sponsored by the union. It is expected that the state president of the union will give an address at the luncheon hour, followed by special music from members of the union. There will also be a band concert and dancing in the evening in the pavilion.

Saturday is sponsored by the granges, and is known as grange day. This, too, will witness a magnificent dinner. State Master Ray Gill has been invited to address the grangers at this time. The afternoon will be filled with a program by the granges.

No admission will be charged to the grounds or to any of the concessions except the dance. It is the hope of the Washington Co. Fair Board that they may continue year after year to build this to a greater fair with a free admission.

Anna M. Waite, 74, wife of F. B. Waite died at the Good Samaritan hospital after a week's illness. Mrs. Waite was a native of Oregon. She was the daughter of Fendel Sutherland, and Lucy Richardson Sutherland, Oregon pioneers of 1847.

She was born June 16, 1860, where the town of Sutherland is now located. Two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Waite celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. At that time they were operating a dairy at Home Valley, Washington. Their first home after their marriage was in Portland where the Multnomah hotel is now located.

Mr. Waite was the founder of the town of Sutherland, Ore., in Douglas County, and was for many years active in the land development in that part of the state.

Mrs. Waite is survived by her widower, a daughter Mrs. Mildred Stuart of Washougal, Wash., a son F. S. Waite of Portland, a sister and a brother.

Funeral services were held at Finley's in Portland Monday afternoon with interment in the family plot at Sutherland, Oregon.
