NEW CATALOG LISTS EDUCATIONAL FILMS

A new catalog listing all moving picture films, lantern slide sets and other materials available from the department of visual instruction, has just been issued by the general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education.

The department of visual instruction of the entire system is located on the Oregon State college campus with U. S. Burt in charge. The present catalog lists the largest collection of such materials ever gathered together for educational use in this state, all of which are available for public use on payment of a small fee ranging from five cents to 25 cents each, used to cover partially the expense of packing and inspecting.

Many of the lantern slide sets and moving picture films include lectures which may be given along with the pictures, making them adaptable to a wide variety of group meetings. A copy of the catalog may be had free on request from the Corvallis office.

WHEAT CONTRACTS ARE NOT CANCELLED

Wheat contracts for 1934 have not been cancelled. There seems to be an idea going around that because of the drought and another short wheat crop that these contracts are not going to be in force for the 1933 crop. Such is not the case. The only change that has been made is in regard to the amount of the reduction in acreage to be made. For the 1935 crop the wheat contract signer will be required to cut his average acreage 10 per cent. This means that he will have a little bit higher maximum acreage than he had last year but his minimum acreage remains the same.

Regulations issued by the wheat administration concerning the use of land taken out of wheat production are about the same as for last year. Some things were permitted in connection with the 1934 crop which contract signers should not expect in the case of the 1935 crop. The land put aside, as contracted acres must average as good as the land on which wheat is grown. Swale land will not answer the purpose. Grass or legume crops may be seeded on contracted acreage or such land may be summer fallowed. Land that is already in pasture or meadow at the beginning of the 1935 crop year shall not be included as contracted acreage for 1935.

Compliance forms for 1934 have all been forwarded to Washington, D. C. from this county. No one knows just when we will get our money, probably a few weeks yet. There are two payments due now; one payment of approximately seven cents per bushel on the allotment for the 1933 crop and the first payment on the 1934 crop. These will not be paid in one check. There will be two checks some little time apart.
