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The Cook's Nook

Unusually Good Foods for odd Hours

The menus and schedules don't mention them, and the cook books don't give them a chapter, but who was ever known not to eat them—these between-times foods? It may be late at night when the inner man won't let you go to bed hungry; it may be after school when the young things troop home with visions of cookie jars speeding their steps; it might be in the middle of the afternoon when a cup of tea and its accompaniment serves to divide the noon from the evening. And it may be at any old time at all, just because somebody is hungry. But some time or other a bite or a sup will be indulged in—who says we don't like to eat between-meals?

The favorite foods for these off-schedule hours are those developed by the family itself. Often enjoying an unsung reputation, the recipes are usually passed along by word of mouth. From this source we learn the appeal of a fruit cookie with afternoon tea; of a chewy confection during leisure hours; of a slice of "bread and spread" served on the kitchen table; and the healthful goodness of a glass of milk and dates at any old hour. The children love the golden dates, and will eschew less wholesome foods to chew dates, thus getting their vitamins quite unsuspecting.

Cookies for Everybody

(Basic Recipe and Variations)

2 cups flour
2 tps. baking powder
1/4 to 1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 pkg. dates
1 tsp. vanilla
1/3 to 1/2 cup shortening
2/3 cup sugar
1 egg
1/4 cup milk or water

Sift the flour, salt, and baking powder. Mix the sliced dates through the flour with the finger tips. Cream the shortening; stir in the sugar gradually, then the unbeaten egg. Mix well, add the milk and vanilla. Stir in the dry ingredients. Drop by teaspoonfuls on the reverse side of a well-oiled baking sheet or dripping pan. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) until firm to the touch and delicate brown in color. This recipe will make about 36 cookies.

Cranberry Jam

(Makes excellent sandwiches combined with cream cheese)

1 cup cranberries
1 pint water
1 pkg. dates
1/2 cup sugar

Pit the dates or use ready-pitted variety and place them in a saucepan with the water and the cranberries. Boil the mixture gently for 20 minutes, stirring frequently. Add the sugar and cook for 10 minutes or until the mixture is thick. Pour into sterilized containers while hot and seal unless you plan to use it right away.

Pick-Up Sandwiches

(Made from "What's In the pantry")

Take some peanut butter from the jar and stir it with a little cream (to take away "clinging" propensities). Spread it on bread—it is best on graham or whole wheat—and stick sliced dates on top the filling. Put on the top slice and there's your sandwich.

Apple Sauce Cake

(Keeps Moist for a Long Time)

2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. cloves
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 cup hot, thick strained apple sauce

Sift the flour, soda, spices, and salt together. Mix the dates through the dry ingredients with the finger tips. Cream the butter; stir in the sugar gradually. Add the beaten egg, then the applesauce and the dry ingredients alternately. Beat thoroughly. Pour the batter into a cake pan which has been lined with oiled paper or well greased and dusted with flour. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for about 40 minutes. This recipe will yield 16 servings.

After School Spread

1/3 cup orange juice
1 tbsp. butter
1 pkg. dates
1 tsp. honey

Place all the ingredients in a saucepan and cook over low heat until a thick paste is formed. Stir the mixture frequently to prevent burning. Cool and spread between graham crackers, vanilla wafers or
