The Cook's Nook

They're Tears that Make You Happy Say Cooks Who Peel 'Em and Weep

Tattle-tale though it may be, there's no food so full of flavor as the onion! It causes weak women to shed salty tears and strong men to forget their waistlines, but it is the indispensable vegetable to the cook who knows her seasonings.

In small quantities the onion has a subtle flavor; in large it is a pungent and juicy ingredient. It is a relative of the snail, chive, and garlic, and more versatile than any of them. There is a variety of onion for every purpose. Common yellow or brown onions are best when a small amount is desired for flavor or for serving as a vegetable. White onions are milder in flavor and the large white ones are usually used for slicing or serving raw. Tiny white onions are used for pickling, and the red-skinned onions for any purpose. All of them have flavor galore.

You can sometimes avoid weeping when you peel onions. Hold the hands under running water or immerse them under the surface of a pan of water while cutting off the dry outer layers of skin; this dissolves the irritating juices of the outer skin and makes the operation less tearful.

As for the "aftermath", remember that cooked onions are not guilty! Try them in these delicious dishes, and find out why such strong arguments are advanced in their favor.

Cream of Onion Soup

2 tbsps. rice
2 medium sized onions
2 tbsps. fat
1 cup water
1 tsp. meat extract or a bouillon cube
3 cups milk
Salt and pepper

Chop the onions and cook in the fat until slightly yellow. Add the water, rice and meat extract or bouillon cube, and cook until the rice and onions are tender. Add the milk, reheat, and season with salt and pepper. This makes four servings; it will be found that the rice much improves this soup.

Glazed Onions

Boil four small white onions until almost tender. Then mix in a frying pan: a tablespoon of butter, 2 tablespoons dark corn syrup, and a teaspoon of water. Stir over low heat until well-blended, adding a little more water if necessary. Then reheat the boiled onions in this mixture, stirring occasionally until the onions become brown and
