They will bear interest at the rate of six percent (6%) per annum payable semi-annually on the first day of May and November of each year. Said bonds will be numbered serially from F1 to F7 inclusive being in denomination of five hundred dollars (\$500) each and F7 being in the denomination of four hundred seventy three and 50/100 dollars (\$473.50). All of the bonds of this issue will be subject to redemption at the call of the Town of Beaverton at or after one year from date. These bonds will carry a pledge of the full faith and credit of the Town of Beaverton.
