Hostesses Hail "Hallow-Baloo"

As way to give Hallowe'en Party when gaunt witches rise and owls tweet yoo-hoo—that's the night for Hallow-baloo! "Hallow-baloo" is, of course, a coined word for the general hula-baloo that accompanies All-hallows' Eve festivities on the spooks' night out.

It's hard to resist giving a party on Hallowe'en, it's so easy. You can borrow or beg pumpkins and Autumn leaves for decorations; you can get out the third-best sheets or broomsticks and capes for costumes; and the entertainment must consist of traditional games and "rites" dear to the spook-lovers.

Naturally, "refreshments will be served" and of course they must be first, in the correct colors; second, in the spirit of the holiday; third, simple enough so that hostess can join the merriment; and fourth, bewitching as a hobgoblin! All of the following fill every requirement and are clever and economical as well.

Hallowe'en Gingerbread

Gingerbread is a tradition on Hallowe'en. Of course we all have our favorite recipes, but there are various things we can do to it to give that Hallowe'en touch. Bake it beforehand and frost with orange frosting or bake it hot at refreshment time and serve with whipped cream tinted orange. If you like, split the hot gingerbread, spread a mixture of cream cheese (tinted orange and blended with cream), sliced dates and chopped nuts on top the bottom layer, then put on top layer and serve hot. Or serve gingerbread baked in cup cake pans with orange ice.

Apples on a Stick

Not everybody can bob for apples in a tub, so have some candied ones on sticks for the revelers to chew on.

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup maple corn syrup
1/2 cup water
1 tbs. butter
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla

Cook sugar, syrup, water, salt and butter until syrup crackles when tried in cold water. Remove from fire and add flavoring. Stick a skewer in the stem end of an apple, dip one at a time into hot syrup and place on oiled pan to cool.

Hobgoblin Confections

The Hallowe'en colors are carried out in "hobgoblins" which are our old friend stuffed dates in new form. Of course the dates may be served plain, passed right in their own boxes. But for a party touch, stuff some of the dates with orange fondant, leaving a bit exposed.
