The Cook's Nook

Beef and Kidney Pie

4 cups cooked beef in 1 in. pieces
2 pr. kidneys
2 cups cooked sliced carrots
1 cup cooked small or sliced onions
2 1/2 cups plain gravy
3 cups seasoned mashed potatoes
1 egg, beaten
Arrange the meat, carrots and onions in a one and a half quart casserole or in 6 individual casseroles. Pour over the gravy, then top with the mashed potatoes to which the egg has been added. Bake in a hot oven (450° F.) for 45 minutes. Serves 6.

Virginia Spoon Bread

1/2 cup corn-meal
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cups milk
2 eggs
Place the corn meal and salt in a saucepan. Stir in 1 1/2 cups milk. Stir over direct heat until a thick mush is formed or about 2 minutes. Remove from stove and stir in 1 egg, unbeaten. Mix thoroughly and turn into a buttered baking dish suitable for serving at the table. Beat the second egg slightly in the saucepan in which the mush was cooked, stir in the remainder of the milk. Pour over the mush, cut the mush with a knife so that the two mixtures are only partially mixed. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) for 30 minutes or until the top is puffed and brown. Serve from the baking dish with a spoon. Eat with butter, salt and pepper or with butter and syrup.

You won't need to dine at a Cafe in Rome, nor order from a "fine Italian menu card" to have a dessert with a foreign air, right at home. A chef's secret for "Biscuit Tortoni" has been found out.

Biscuit Tortoni

2/3 cup sugar
1/4 cup water
1/4 tsp. gelatine
1/3 cup corn syrup
1/4 cup macaroons
1/4 cup blanched almonds
1 pt. whipping cream
1 tsp. vanilla
6 egg yolks
Boil sugar, corn syrup and water to 238° F. Pour slowly on beaten egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until mixture thickens. Pour over gelatine which has been soaking in cold water 5 minutes. Chill to same temperature as cream and fold in whipped cream and flavoring. When ready to freeze add almonds, chopped in small pieces and macaroons which have been finely crumbed. 12 servings.

Rice Pilau

(Baked Rice and Pork)
2 thick slices of salt pork, finely diced
1/4 cup rice
3 cups hot water
2 medium sized onions, cut fine
2 cups tomato juice and pulp
4 tbsps. minced parsley
Salt, pepper and paprika
Fry the salt pork in a skillet until it is slightly browned. Then add the rice which has been washed and drained, and stir until the rice is a golden brown, adding the onion meantime. Add the hot water gradually, cover and cook until the rice is tender. Then add the remaining ingredients. Place the mixture in greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (about 350° F.) for 1/2 hour. 6 servings.

6 sour apples
1/2 cup corn syrup
