The Cook's Nook

Let's Give Thanks the Good Old Way

Old-fashioned ways are the best ways to celebrate Thanksgiving—the family together, the children at home, and an old-fashioned dinner in the middle of the day.

It's away with the modernistic china and the new plaid cloth, it's off with the very latest food fad and the last word in decorative schemes. When Thanksgiving comes it's on with the old, the tried, and the dear to the heart of our childhood.

The menu plans itself when November 29th becomes a traditional holiday—what could we have but fowl—a fine turkey or duck or chicken; what could we serve but the "regular fixings" and the proverbial foods! Let the only modern note be the new methods we use to prepare them; the methods that the Pilgrim Priscilla would have used, had she known about them! Here are efficient ways to prepare our revered feast-day foods, may they help the cook to be thankful she lives in 1934.

The First Course

Oyster cocktails begin the feast in many homes, hostesses serving them with a piquant sauce and little oysterettes. Others prefer an Autumn fruit cup of grapes, canned grapefruit segments, orange sections and sliced dates. Still others think the dinner should begin with soup and saltinas. The answer is: choose "according to your lights."

The Main Course

First the bird! And with it will come mashed potatoes, sweet potatoes, and your favorite two vegetables—squash and onion, perhaps, or carrots, turnips or cauliflower. To candy your Sweet Potatoes peel and boil them in salted water, then drain (when tender), put them in a deep dish and pour a third of a cup of melted butter, a half cup dark corn syrup and 2 tablespoons of water over them. Bake in a moderate oven for an hour, basting frequently. Creamed Carrots are easy: boil scraped carrots in just enough water to cover. When tender remove carrots from pan, measure liquid, and add enough hot milk to make a cup of liquid. Put two tablespoonsful fat in a tablespoon flour. Add liquid season, return carrots, (sliced) and heat.

The Relishes

Cranberry sauce there must be, either the kind obtainable in cans, or that made at home. Also, there will be celery, and olives, and sweet gherkins, and on some festive boards cole slaw with green peppers and pimientos.

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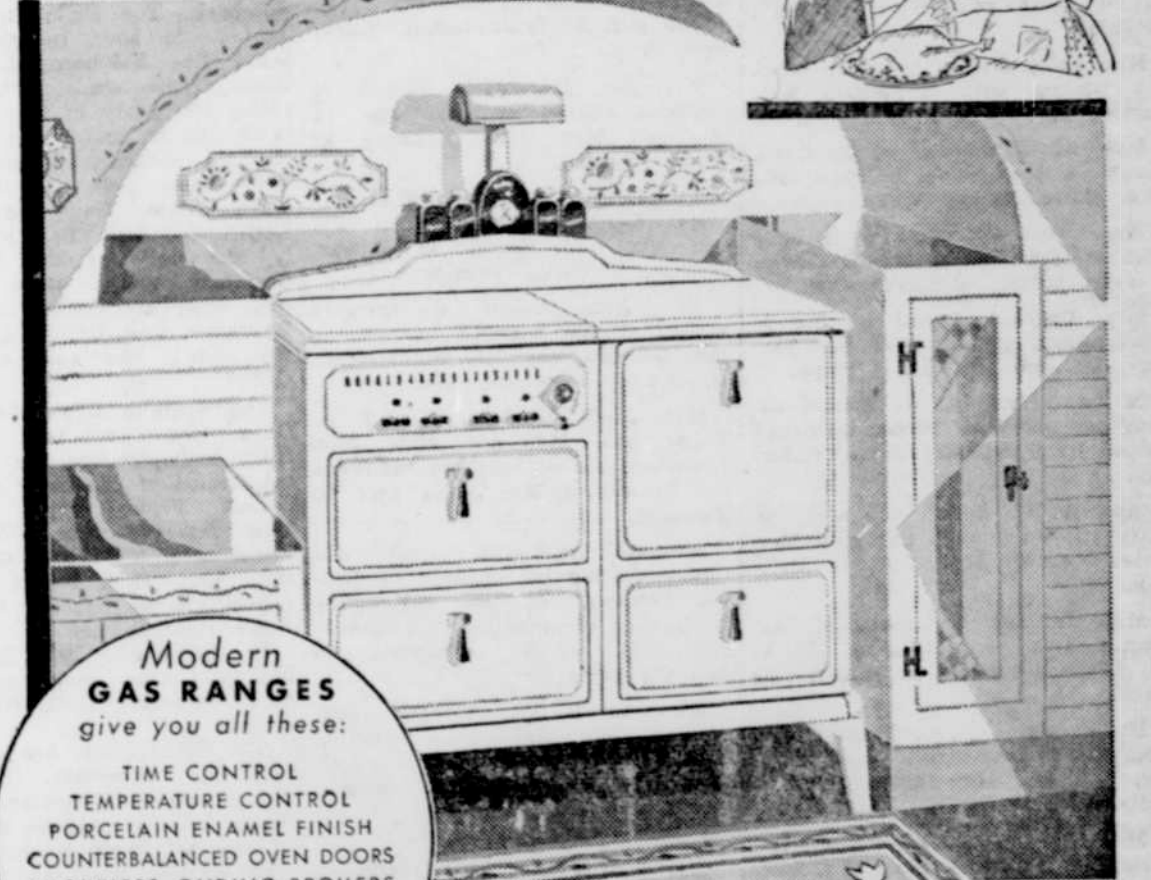
