"Sing A Song of Soup" Is Tuneful

Suggestion For Autumn Theme Song
Soup, that sibilant beginning to a good meal, is worth all the noise that's made over it! A hot savory soup warms the very cockles on a frosty day. A sturdy cream soup can satisfy and "stick to our ribs" and a delicate, clear soup stimulate the appetite. And none is quite so good at the homestead variety with its pleasing medley of the flavors you like best.

The requisites of a good bowl, plate or cup of soup are too obvious to need cataloging. Every body knows soup must be hot and well seasoned. It should also contain something of interest—some "savory" flakes of rice for the spoon to "dive for," some croutons on top, or some juicy vegetables. The texture of the cream soup is important—it should be neither too thick or too thin, and never, never, never lumpy!

One Dish Supper Soup

Here's a soup that can be the main course for a whole meal, because its basis is rice which adds food value to any dish. Note that eggs are cooked right in the soup.
1 cup rice
1 cup chopped celery
2 small onions
1 green pepper
1 pt. tomatoes
6 eggs
3 cups water
Salt

Have water boiling in a kettle and add chopped celery and onions. Add green pepper (chopped) and cook slowly 15 minutes. Just before serving break the eggs into the hot soup and sprinkle with grated cheese. Cover and keep in warm place 5 minutes. Cook rice in boiling salted water until tender, (or use steamed rice which has been previously cooked). Put mound of rice in tureen or put individual portions in soup plates and pour hot soup over them. Serve with crackers and tart pickles.

Spinach Soup De Luxe

If Junior won't eat his spinach plain, see what he does with it in a good cream soup. Our guess is that he'll eat it with relish.

1/2 tsp. flour
1 cup milk
1/2 cup cooked spinach
1/2 tsp. salt
Slice of onion
Scald milk to which slice of onion has been added. Heat a tablespoon of cooking oil in top of double boiler and stir in flour. Remove from heat and stir in hot milk gradually. Stir slowly over direct heat until sauce begins to boil. Season to taste and combine with cooked spinach which has been rubbed through a sieve with water in which it was cooked. Reheat.

Fish Chowder and Rice

Chowder is a hearty soup, and this one, served with snowy rice, and made with salt pork is new.

2 cups cooked rice
1 slice salt pork
2 lbs. fish
3 potatoes
1 onion
1/2 cup butter
2 cups milk
1 pint hot water
Salt and pepper

Prepare fish by cleaning and cutting into slices about an inch thick. Place in the bottom of a deep kettle the salt pork; over these spread the thinly sliced potatoes, now a layer of the fish sprinkled over with salt, pepper and a little minced onion; over these a layer of cold boiled rice, salt and pepper and bits of butter. Repeat these alternate layers of pork, potatoes, rice, fish and seasoning; add the hot water; put a tight-fitting lid on the kettle and simmer gently for an hour. Remove the lid, add two cups of hot cream or milk and serve. It may be served without the milk, if preferred.

Bermuda Soup

It is important when pre-cooking vegetables for soup, to be sure they have no fatty taste, and retain their texture. In this onion soup recipe, note that the onions are cooked in a smooth oil, only until straw colored.

6 medium onions
2 cups water
1 tsp. butter
2 tbsps. flour
2 cups milk
Salt
Cayenne pepper
1 egg yolk
1 (3 1/2-oz.) can pimientos

Chop onion; place in a sauce-pan with two tablespoons cooking oil, cover and cook over low flame until onions are straw colored. Add water and boil uncovered for 30 minutes or until onions are tender. Rub through a sieve. Melt butter, add flour, add milk gradually, and beat to boiling point, stirring frequently. Add onion puree, season. Just before serving, stir in slightly beaten egg yolk, and minced pimientos.

Garnishes Are Important

What you serve with the soup is also important. Try serving minced pimiento, with cream soups; minced chives are good with potato soup; popped corn is excellent with clear soups; salted whipped cream is good with bouillon. Always good of course are the various sorts of crackers and croutons.

Making The Home More Livable

Purposeful Lamps for Study and Reading

OF COURSE no mother means to hurt her children's eyes or her own. Nor does Betty, away at college in the hubbub of quizzes and rushing teas, mean to injure hers.

Yet they do that very thing when they fail to provide good lighting for reading, study or sewing. And that, scientists say, is one reason why 20% of grammar school children, and 40% of college students have defective eyes.

Now comes a new lamp that obligingly takes such responsibilities off mothers' and students' shoulders!

You will know you are actually protecting eyesight when you use it, because it bears a tag of approval showing it meets specifications of a national scientific organization, the Illuminating Engineering Society, designating it as an "I. E. S. Study and Reading Lamp."

And what a relief such scientific approval is—when you consider that good light actually adds to the alertness and chances of success for your child. Recent comparative school room tests reveal that pupils studying under

good light are keener and more progressive than those handicapped by poor lighting.

One of the nice things about the I. E. S. lamp, designs for which have been created by many leading manufacturers, is its variety of style.

Whether you live in a spacious home, college dormitory or modest cottage, appropriate ones to suit every purse are available for any decorative scheme beside chair, davenport, or on table or desk.

Several things make these lamps "kind to the eyes." The one in the large sketch at the right is scientifically the correct height for the table, 19 inches from base to bottom of shade.

A glass bowl in each lamp shade directs light upward and at the same time sends well-diffused light downward, thus eliminating glare. Excellent results are attained by using a standard 100-watt bulb for which all have been designed.

A few of the many designs are indicated in the sketch at the left: a wall type fitting on a push pin, and others for floor and table. With lamps like these, Johnny and Betty have no excuse for low grades!
