KATAHDIN POTATOES ARE HEAVY YIELDERS

Katahdin potatoes again this year yielded more heavily than did Burbanks in the same fields planted at the same time. This is the new variety of potato developed by the United States Department of Agriculture and which only recently was introduced into commercial production. This makes the third crop harvested by a few growers in the county and they have consistently yielded better than other varieties planted along with them.

Because they are heavy yielders and have produced more potatoes to the acre than the Burbanks or Gems does not mean that they should entirely displace these latter varieties. Burbanks have for years been the standard variety on the hills of this section and so far as we can see now should remain so. This is a variety, however, that has a definite place on some farms where they grow a few spuds each year. Down in the Valley where drouth usually comes a little earlier and where something a little more resistant to this dry weather is needed and where the soil is a little heavier, the Katahdin variety might well be grown. Owing to its larger root system it stands the drouth better and that is the primary reason for its larger yields.

The potato itself is not round and this is one reason that it is not being received with more general favor. The consuming trade has become accustomed to expect high quality in potatoes of the long variety and consequently a potato that is round is not looked upon with quite so much favor. This one is an exception and has unusually good quality. In the crop just harvested, A. J. Rowell of Scholls reports considerably heavier yield of Katahdins than Burbanks planted side by side in the same field at the same time. S. T. Walters, Portland, Route 2, planted Burbanks and Katahdins in the same field on the same day and harvested about 60 per cent more crop per acre from the Katahdin variety than he did from the Burbanks. J. R. Fubols was another grower locally who had a few of this variety. This year for the first time there is some seed available and some inquiry from out of state for seed. Burbanks will remain the standard crop here and because of their popularity, it is well that they should do so. While this new spud is of high quality and a heavy yielder, it should not at this time be grown as extensively as the older varieties.
