HAZELDALE BLUE RIBBON WINNERS MEET

A meeting of the Hazeldale Blue Ribbon Winners was held at the home of Joe Berger, a very prominent member of the club, Tuesday, December 18, 1934.

The meeting was called to order by the leader, Mr. Ray Kincheio and discussion in general immediately began. The topic brought forth at this meeting concerned plans for club demonstrations to be made in the spring. Having decided to gather outside material on this subject, the meeting was adjourned.

On Oregon Farms

Eugene—Lane county farmers purchased 36,000 pounds of Grimm alfalfa seed in 1934. This was enough to plant approximately 3000 acres of alfalfa, and while many farmers probably failed to obtain stands because of adverse weather conditions, not less than 2700 acres of this crop were successfully established in Lane county this year. This is a considerable increase over the previous alfalfa acreage in the county, he says.

Lakeview—A row and a half of Lespedeza seed, planted as a demonstration trial on the farm of C. W. Ogles in the Idaho district of Lake county on May 22 grew to a height of only 11 inches this year. This would indicate, Mr. Ogle believes, that yellow sweet clover, barley or oats would make a better emergency hay or pasture crop than Lespedeza in this section.

Toledo—Possibilities of the expansion of cauliflower production to a commercial cash crop in Lincoln county is indicated by a check up of several trial plantings put out in August, reports County Agent M. J. Conklin. While some trials failed because the plants were not properly handled, satisfactory growth was obtained on the farms of G. Dahl, W. F. Wakefield, Claus Christiansen and A. Lisi. The unusually dry weather tended to hinder leaf growth. The fact that the plants headed a little too early is believed to indicate that sowing of the seed for plants should be delayed until the middle of August.

Eugene—J. W. Webb and A. E. Webb of Fisher are cooperating on an irrigation project to provide both farms with supplemental water from one ditch. The water will be taken from Buck creek and will be used on about 30 acres on the two places. They were assisted in laying out the project recently by Arthur King, extension specialist in soils from O.S.C., and County Agent O. S. Fletcher.

Hillsboro—Plans for extending his irrigation project, already supplying 120 acres on his farm with supplemental water, are being made by John Thornburgh of Hillsboro, reports County Agent W. F. Cyrus. The extension will mean about 3600 feet of flume. When completed he will have approximately 160 acres, or practically all of his farm that can be irrigated, under water. The additional irrigated acreage will be seeded to ladino clover.

Prineville—Sheep flocks near Terbonne and Powell Butte where stiff lamb trouble had been reported lately were visited by County Agent W. B. Tucker, who diagnosed the difficulty as nutritional rather than a specific disease. Changes in feeding rations were recommended by Mr. Tucker to see if this would not overcome the trouble.

Gold Beach—A number of erosion control demonstrations, using 10,000 pounds of Kentucky blue grass seed recently made available by the federal government, are to be started in Curry county in the near future by County Agent R. M. Knox and G. R. Hyslop, chief of the plant industry division at O.S.C. It is planned to make five large plantings of about 100 acres each on recently burned-over land, and to distribute the remainder of the seed to a number of co-operators for trial on a smaller scale under varying conditions.

Tillamook—Primarily in an attempt to find a suitable grass that will thrive on the prairie soil and hill land of Tillamook county, grass nurseries have been established on the farms of B. W. Neilson, J. H. Steppa and F. H. Neilson, to test 17 varieties of grass. These include English rye, Italian rye, meadow fescue, chewing fescue, highland reed canary grass, Kentucky bluegrass, bulbous bluegrass, orchard grass, smooth brome, tall oat grass, timothy, red top, meadow foxtail, Astoria and Seaside bent. River bottom soil, such as that on the F. H. Neilson farm, seems particularly adapted to rye grass and clover, according to Kenneth Carl, assistant county agent, but it is believed possible that a better mixture may be obtained by observing the growth of the varieties in the nursery on this farm.

(Continued from Front Page) information they furnish for public health, legal and social purposes. To the statistician birth records are of interest because the population is replenished by births—the growth of population being due in measure to the excess of births over deaths, because of the effect of the birth rate upon age distribution of population, because the birth records contain information of the nationality of the parents, and when used in connection with mortality statistics enable the statistician to compare the infant mortality of different races.

Among the legal uses of birth records the following are some of the more important:

1. As proof of age and legitimacy of heirs. (This is probably one of the most important uses of birth records.)
2. In Criminal courts: To determine whether a minor defendant shall be tried in the Childrens Court or in General Sessions.
3. As proof of age of the complainant in cases of rape.
4. As proof of birth in bastardy proceedings.

Birth records are also used for a number of purposes as follows:

1. Admission into the public schools.
2. Obtainment of certificates of employment between 14 and 16 years of age.
3. Proof of age for exclusion from provisions of selective service in the army or navy.
4. Proof of dependency in claim for exemption from military service.
5. Obtainment of passports.
6. Obtainment of license to marry.
